Black History Month to be celebrated at True Vine Fellowship

Black History Month will be celebrated Sunday, Feb. 23 with a program hosted at True Vine Fellowship in Sedalia.

The annual event highlights the impact African Americans made throughout the history of the United States.

Alona Reid, the president of Sedalia/Pettis County Chapter of the NAACP, said on Wednesday that the public is invited to the event. The local chapter is sponsoring the event.

"We try to celebrate Black history every year," Reid said. "Especially now since our President is trying to do away with the DEL. Our theme for this year is 'Don't Tell Me What You're About, Show Me What You're About.'"

The event's speaker is the Rev. Ron Tooley,

who pastors Mt. Olive Baptist Church in Marshall.

"We're going to have the various Black churches, and somebody from each church is going to do something," Reid said. "It will probably be like a musical selection — either singing or something like that. I plan to do a short video, which is called, 'Heroes.' It's the song by Mariah Carey."

Reid noted the video will have different photos of African Americans who have helped shape America over the years.

"We'll also do a couple of quizzes," Reid said. "We like to get everybody involved. So, there will be a couple of quizzes with 10 questions, and whoever answers the question first receives a \$5 cash prize."

Reid said it's essential to observe Black History Month and keep it at the forefront of America's mind. See **EVENT**, Page A6

Bothwell holds Honor Walk for Fifth Street fire victim

A Sedalia woman died as the result of a Tuesday, Feb. 18 fire near the 900 block of West Fifth Street, Sedalia Fire Chief Matt Irwin announced during the Wednesday, Feb. 19, Sedalia City Council meeting.

Irwin was invited to the podium by Mayor Andrew Dawson to deliver the news. "Mayor, members of the council, I apologize for the interruption," Irwin said. "As you are aware, we had a fire Monday night into Tuesday morning where we were able to rescue a woman from that house. Unfortunately, I was just notified that she has passed away."

The woman was pulled

from a room on the second floor of the home near East Fifth Street and South Quincy Avenue and, like others, was transported to the hospital suffering from smoke inhalation. The others recovered, but her smoke exposure was too severe for recovery.

"She was an organ donor and with the number of viable organs and so I'm leaving council because we are doing an honor walk for her at the hospital," Irwin said. "Fire crews and EMS crews are going to be there, so I apologize, but I'm going to be stepping away. I just wanted to let you know that unfortunately, she has passed away but, in that death, she has given the gift of life to a number of other people."

Irwin's statement hit everyone hard.

"In the middle of the council meeting when the chief got up to tell us, that was awful, absolutely devastating," Fourth Ward Council Rhiannon Foster said. "I don't think that any of us were prepared for what he was going to say and those honor walks are, oh my gosh, we were all about to cry. It was very hard to stay focused and continue the meeting."

A somber tone settled over the remaining meeting as final agenda items were completed. During the comments portion of the meeting, Dawson expressed his condolences to the deceased woman's family.

"I just like to say my heart goes out to the family

who's facing that loss, unfortunately," Dawson said.

Across town at Bothwell Regional Health Center, a small crowd of people, hospital staff, EMTs, doctors and nurses quietly gathered outside the hospital's Critical Care Unit.

The woman's gurney was then pushed through the hallways by a team of her caregivers, followed by family, as people lined the walls to pay their respects.

Crews responded to the fire after 11 p.m. Monday, Feb. 18, in the 900 block of West Fifth St. Eight people were left displaced.

The fire is still under investigation by the Missouri Fire Marshal's office.

At Don's Truck Towing and Truck Wash, 4735 South Limit Ave, Vice President Frosty Weaver's team is only a phone call away when truckers get into trouble on local snowy highways.

"If I-70 gets bad you can tell a big difference, yes," Weaver said.

Don's runs a fleet of

trucks big enough to rescue any vehicle wrecked out along the interstate.

"We get them turned over, we get them jack-knifed, we get them where they can't climb the hills," Weaver said. "Get them turned over."

The interstate highways are the scene of many big rig accidents, especially when the weather turns bad.

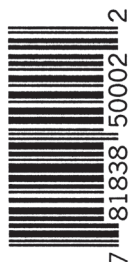
"On I-70 is where there's a lot of it," Weaver said. "On ramps, you know, they pulled over or slide off the road and then you get some big pileups."

Missouri Senators propose tax credit for homeschool, private school families

Missouri's homeschool families and those enrolled in private schools could receive a tax credit for their educational expenses under legislation debated Tuesday by the Senate Education Committee.

The credit would be capped at the annual state adequacy target, a number determined by the per-pupil expenditure of the highest performing school districts in the state.

Currently, that amount is \$7,145.

The credit would be administered by the Missouri Department of Revenue. There is currently a tax-credit scholarship program overseen by the State Treasurer's Office, called MOScholars, which provides a credit for donations to certain nonprofits that then disperse the money to families enrolling in private schools.

The proposals debated on Tuesday, in contrast, would allow families to directly get a refund for expenses related to educating their children.

State Sen. Rick Brattin, a Republican from Harrisonville and one of the bill's sponsors, compared the structure to the gas tax refund, in which drivers can submit gas receipts to the state for reimbursement.

The tax credit program would be a path for families to escape underperforming schools, said state Sen. Nick Schroer, a Republican from Defiance sponsoring a similar bill.

"For decades, Missouri dramatically increased education spending, yet student outcomes continue to decline," he said. "More money has not solved the problem in the state of Missouri, and it's clear that a one-size-fits-all system for educating our youth is failing to educate many of our children."

While the state education budget is due for an increase in the hundreds of millions this year, the formula that funds public schools has been relatively stagnant for over a decade with inflation outpacing any increases.

Gov. Mike Kehoe, lawmakers and the State Board of Education have all called for an examination of the formula.

Schroer began considering a homeschool tax credit when he was a state representative after hearing from homeschooling families about other states' policies.

"There are many individuals, whether it's private school, homeschool or hybrid, who've indicated that they would like to at least recoup some of those expenses since they're not utilizing the public school system," he said.

Brattin said his office received "an influx of opposition," referring to homeschooling families worried about alterations to the state's homeschool protections. Home educators have opposed tax credits and other public programs in recent years, saying they are worried about governmental oversight.

Brattin said the idea that it would impose restrictions on homeschooling families is a "myth."

"Nothing in this bill is a requirement. Nothing

in this bill is a database. Nothing in this bill is a list to take away rights, freedoms and liberties of individuals," he said. "In fact, this only bolsters that and gives the full capability and freedom and liberty for families that want different options."

Despite his reassurance, the first person in opposition represented home educators.

David Klarich, a lobbyist for the homeschooling group Family Covenant Ministries, said Missouri has "the best home education statute in the United States." He asked for the bill to only apply to a separate category of home educators created last year in a large education package.

"Those parents who want to participate in public schools or take public dollars may then do so, and there would be no concern about governmental intrusion because then those parents and students go wide-eyed into the governmental system and they can still participate," Klarich said.

He feared there would be "strings attached," leading to curriculum oversight.

State Sen. David Gregory, a Republican from Chesterfield, said he is "not seeing where the strings are attached"

Public education groups

also had concerns.

Otto Fajen, lobbyist for teachers' union Missouri National Education Association, told committee members that the legislation could further restrict the amount of the state's general revenue available for public education.

"(This bill) is on its own, without connecting with what's going on with the (public school funding) formula, what's going on with minimum salaries, and kicks in quickly to offer this tax benefit for supporting educational expenditures and significantly affects state general revenues," he said.

A large education package passed a year ago has raised teacher salaries statewide with the help of general revenue and created a funding obligation of \$200 million this year with all its provisions.

Kehoe has also indicated he will push to eliminate the state's income tax. If the governor's plan succeeds, Fajen said, there will be no money available for the rebate.

"It creates a lot of problems that you all will have to deal with through the budgeting process," he said, "and that schools will have to deal with going forward."

The committee, which is chaired by Brattin, did not take action on the legislation Tuesday.

Miracles happen — I am living proof

Last Sunday, my pastor gave us “homework.” We were to reflect on a time when a miracle happened in our lives. Now, I don’t have to think too hard about that one.

In three weeks, I will be an eight-year survivor of a rare, aggressive cancer called synovial sarcoma. That in and of itself is a medical miracle. I was born at the right time in history, with access to the right doctors and medicines, with plenty of love and support from family and friends.

All this combined to keep me from dying of a cancer so rare that the five-year survival prediction is basically useless. It reads “anywhere from 36% to 76% of people with synovial sarcoma will be alive five years after their first diagnosis.”

But that’s not nearly the end of the story.

Notice that prediction reads, “first diagnosis.”

Synovial sarcoma has a nasty little habit of coming back, sometimes years after the initial cancer is beaten. When it does, it’s almost always in the lungs. And when that happens, it’s usually a steep downhill slide from there. The five-year survival rate for people diagnosed with metastatic synovial sarcoma is only 14.8 percent. The median survival time is 22 months.

A couple years after initial diagnosis, check-up scans revealed a tiny spot in my left lung. It was too small even to biopsy. The only treatment was “watch and wait.” So we did, for two years. It grew, but not like metastatic cancer usually grows, almost overnight. Instead, it expanded slowly, half a millimeter here and there. We held out hope it was something benign, a scar or a “bit of fluff” that can occur in Midwestern individuals who constantly breathe in pollens and molds. In 2021, the spot reached six millimeters, just large enough for a surgeon to pluck it from my lung with his fingers. It needed to be removed so we could finally see what it was. I was scheduled for surgery in February 2022.

I was terrified. I knew all the statistics. The debilitating anxiety I’d experienced when I was going through treatment returned. I couldn’t focus on family or work. My limbs would freeze. My mind would go blank. I cried a lot.

A few days before surgery, I visited my pastor. I asked him for a simple blessing, the kind he’d give to anyone who approached him with a run-of-the-mill problem or ailment. Instead, he asked a few questions about the nature of my upcoming procedure. Upon finding out how serious it was, and the gravity of the outcome, he offered to give me Anointing of the Sick. This is a Catholic sacrament first mentioned in the New Testament book of James, chapter five. The priest prays with an individual, invites her to

repent of her sins, and anoints her with blessed olive oil on the forehead, hands and sometimes the site of an illness or injury. The priest prays, “Through this holy anointing

may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up.”

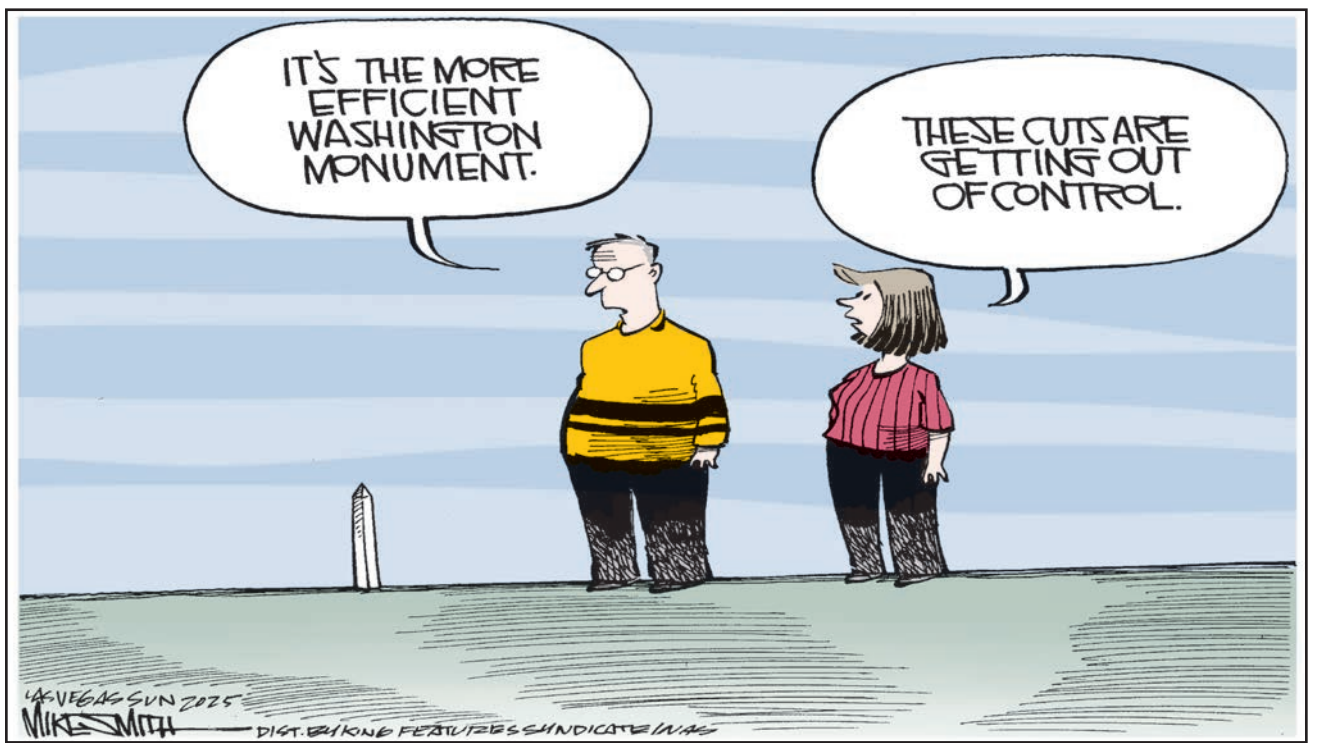
This is not the part where I tell you that the little spot had miraculously disappeared or that it wasn’t cancer. In these past eight years, my life has been full of signs and wonders, but not one of them has played out like a miracle from a children’s fairytale.

No, the first real thing that happened was that my anxiety disappeared. Snap. Poof. Gone. I had a courage I had never experienced before and very rarely since. Armed with supernatural bravery, I did not break down even when the surgeon called me a few days after the procedure to say I had metastatic disease.

The second real thing that happened, and indeed is still happening, is that I have been in remission since February 10, 2022. I have well exceeded the median life expectancy of 22 months, and I am working on the next milestone of five years. I am grateful, bewildered, and sometimes even bereaved. Most of the peers in sickness I met during my first cancer fight have passed away. Yet here I am. I was preserved from death by Jesus Christ through the laying on of hands and anointing with oil.

Many Christians, me included, are too slow to testify to the miracles in our lives. We are loath to have our transformative experiences picked apart by skeptics. Bashful of appearing too earnest and joyful about something otherworldly. In my own case, I feel guilty dancing while so many others mourn, and I try too hard to make sense of the gift of God’s grace. “Why me?” is a question that the living ask just as often as the dying. And “what if?” And scariest of all, “What next?” There are no earthly answers. But the right response to being given a miracle is not to sit around trying to figure it out, worrying that it’s going to be yanked away. It’s to get up and walk, praising the work of God to all those around you.

For instance, after breaking a contract with ICE, the proud boys (not THOSE Proud Boys, but Musk’s proud boys) bragged that they had rid the country of an \$8 billion obligation.

Except that isn’t the truth. The New York Times investigation found the total of that contract to be \$8 million instead of billion. China’s drug warfare against America

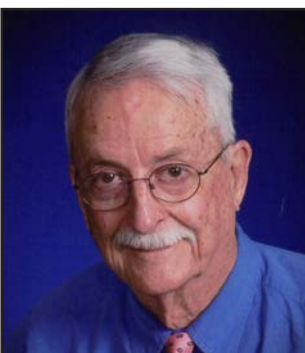
Medical fentanyl can be a Godsend to people who suffer constant pain, such as cancer patients. But the illegal version is another story.

It has become the leading cause of death for Americans aged 19 to 49, according to Congressman Mark Alford’s latest newsletter. I’m not easily shocked, but I was to learn that.

It doesn’t take much fentanyl to kill you, as 2 milligrams will do it, the equivalent of 10 to 15 grains of salt.

A synthetic opioid, fentanyl is 100 times more powerful than morphine and 50 times stronger than heroin.

“It’s poisoning, that’s what’s going on,” said Sedalia Police Det. Mark Cherry in a talk to the Pachyderm Club. He said fentanyl “is becoming more common in

Sedalia,” and is being mixed with other drugs.

I’ve lived in Sedalia for 58 years, and it has never been without a drug problem of some sort, but fentanyl is the worst of the lot. Cherry said fentanyl is responsible for 70% of the drug overdose deaths in this country.

He said criminal gangs, operating in large cities, are part of the distribution network for fentanyl in Missouri.

Local police have made cases for both possession and distribution.

But the big player behind this crisis isn’t a person or group of people, it’s a country — Communist China.

The House Select Committee has been investigating China’s role in the fentanyl “overdose crisis”. A Chinese general had another name for that — “drug warfare.” According to the committee, that war is killing more than 200 Americans every day.

The committee’s summary includes this paragraph:

“Both political parties have acknowledged that the ultimate source of the fentanyl crisis is the People’s Republic of China, which produces over 97% of fentanyl precursors that fuel the global illicit fentanyl

trade.”

China’s strategy appears clear: The more Americans it can kill with powerful drugs the fewer it need fight someday, should it ever come to that.

The Biden administration did little or nothing to confront this crisis, but President Trump is fighting back. Most fentanyl enters this country from Mexico, which faces a 25% tariff on its exports to America if it doesn’t clamp down on the drug traffick. It appears to be cooperating.

Not so China. Trump should go beyond tariffs and threaten to bar all Chinese-made goods from entering this country. That would get China’s attention.

New paid sick leave requirement targeted by Missouri Republicans

Worries that “slackers” may take advantage of Missouri’s new law requiring most employers to give workers paid sick leave isn’t a good enough reason to repeal it, a Democratic lawmaker said Wednesday.

In November, voters overwhelmingly approved an initiative petition called Proposition A that requires employers with business receipts greater than \$500,000 a year to provide at least one hour of paid leave for every 30 hours worked. Employers with fewer than 15 workers must allow workers to use at least 40 hours per year, with larger employers mandated to allow at least 56 hours.

During a House committee hearing Wednesday, Democratic state Rep. Steve Butz of St. Louis challenged Republican state Rep. Sherri Gallick to back up her argument that employees can’t be trusted to use paid sick leave only for the reasons allowed by the law.

“Under the mandated sick leave, potential abuse is nearly impossible to address,” Gallick, a Republican from Belton, told the House Commerce Committee. “Employers cannot ask an employee why they were absent, leaving them vulnerable to lawsuits for merely inquiring.”

Only workers employed under a fixed-term contract are exempt from Missouri’s at-will employment rules.

While the mandate created in Proposition A prohibits employers from firing workers who use the leave, Missouri law doesn’t require employers to give any reason for discharging a worker.

“My hunch is, if you’re a slacker, you’ve been calling in sick already, and this is an at-will state, and I’ve already fired you,” said Butz, who owns an insurance agency.

Proposition A also increased the state minimum wage. It was set at \$13.75 on Jan. 1 and will increase to \$15 an hour on Jan. 1, 2026. After that, it will be adjusted for inflation, as it

has been since 2007.

Gallick is sponsoring a bill to repeal the paid leave law, delay the \$15 minimum wage to 2028 and repeal the provision indexing it to inflation.

Gallick’s bill, as proposed, would have delayed implementation of the paid leave provisions from May 1 to Jan. 1. During the hearing, she presented a substitute with all the provisions she wants to enact.

That change brought some questioning from fellow Republicans who wanted to know why she didn’t include all the things she wanted in the bill when it was filed.

“Was this House committee substitute your original intent?” asked Rep. Don Mayhew, a Republican from Crocker.

“Yes,” Gallick replied. “Then why didn’t you just do that bill instead of this bill that changes a few dates?” Mayhew asked.

Gallick said she filed it to get it in line for a hearing, then listened to businesses in her district to determine what was most important to them.

“That is why I kind of had a kind of a vague bill in the beginning,” Gallick said.

Mayhew said he doesn’t oppose some of the changes but wasn’t pleased with the way it was delivered.

“I’ve never seen one to be this big of a difference between the filed bill and the House committee substitute,” Mayhew said.

Gallick’s bill is one of several being considered in the commerce committee that would alter the terms of Proposition A. There are bills to exempt employers with 50 or fewer workers from the new minimum wage, to limit application of the new minimum wage to workers 21 and older and to repeal the inflation adjustment.

The campaign to pass Proposition A drew no large-scale opposition prior to the vote. But a court challenge filed in early December by major business advocacy groups asks the Missouri Supreme Court to invalidate the vote. The court has set the case for arguments on March 12.

Many of the same groups involved with the lawsuit — Associated Industries of Missouri, the Missouri Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Missouri Grocers Association and others — are backing the bills to change Proposition A.

Ron Berry, a lobbyist for Jobs with Justice, said the challenges should have come earlier.

“When the petition is first certified for circulation, there’s an opportunity to challenge that ballot summary. That didn’t happen,” Berry said Wednesday. “When the petition signatures are turned in and the initiative is certified for the ballot, there’s an opportunity to challenge the signatures. That didn’t happen. None of these challenges started coming until after the voters approved this by 57%.”

Kara Corches, executive director of the Missouri Chamber of Commerce and Industry, said businesses are worried about language barring employers from attempting “to interfere with, restrain, or deny the exercise of, or the attempt to exercise, any right” to paid leave.

The language creates a potential liability that has employers worried about “trial attorneys getting rich off of their backs.”

The paid leave mandate opens the door for other requirements, she said.

“This is a very slippery slope,” Corches said. “Once we start on this, it’s minimum wages, it’s paid sick leave, what’s next? Is it the dress code in your workplace? Is it the days that you’re allowed to be closed?”

Committee Chairman David Casteel, a Republican from High Ridge, said he intends to work through the week to develop a bill that both businesses and advocates defending Proposition A can accept.

“It has never been my intent to overturn the will of the people,” Casteel said. “I just want to create a product that will be agreeable and compromised by both the employee and the employer.”

Missouri Gov. Mike Kehoe orders ban on DEI initiatives in state agencies

Gov. Mike Kehoe signed an executive order Tuesday directing all Missouri state agencies to eliminate diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives.

The order bans agencies from using state funding for diversity training initiatives and from incorporating DEI into hiring and contracting practices.

“Our state agencies must operate under a framework that ensures fairness, equal opportunity, and merit-based decision-making,” Kehoe said in a news release. “This order reaffirms Missouri’s commitment to a constitutional, color-blind approach that serves all citizens fairly.”

The order comes after the Missouri House gave initial approval on Monday to legislation that would create similar restrictions to state funding to DEI initiatives.

During debate on that bill, the sponsor, Rep. Ben Baker, R-Neosho, insisted that the limitations in the bill would not undercut the functions of state agencies, such as the Office of Equal Opportunity.

That agency’s vision, stated on its website, is that it “aims to cultivate a diverse and inclusive environment for all Missourians by centralizing the state’s workforce diversity programs in order to promote a talented workforce that reflects the rich diversity of the citizens of Missouri and

enhance the state’s economy through supplier diversity.”

Agency officials and those at other state departments could not be reached Tuesday for comment on Kehoe’s order.

Kehoe’s order defines diversity, equity and inclusion as including “efforts to manipulate or influence the composition of an organization based solely on race, color, ethnicity, gender identity, or sexual orientation.”

The order also includes policies and programs intended to benefit individuals based on those characteristics.

Kehoe’s statement added that the order “does not apply to any requirements in federal or state statute that uphold the rights and freedoms of Missouri citizens. State agencies will continue to enforce all laws that prohibit discrimination and ensure fairness for all citizens.”

State agencies, like the

University of Missouri, have 90 days to review and dismantle existing initiatives that violate the order.

“At the University of Missouri, we follow all applicable state and federal laws and regulations. We will carefully review this order and ensure we are in compliance with it as applicable,” University of Missouri spokesperson Christopher Ave said in response to the order.

Last year, the Missourian found that designated diversity programs, which have been a target of Missouri Republicans for the past few years, were rare in state agencies.

However, the story noted that DEI concepts could still be part of an agency’s internal practices, hiring and workplace culture.

"I think it's important because our past ancestors have paved the way for us," Reid said. "I can remember growing up, living in a segregated area here in Sedalia. Even though we were young, we didn't really understand it at that time until we were a little bit older. And then I remember when Affirmative Action was a big thing, and a lot of Blacks were being hired. And people were always calling us 'token Blacks,' even though most of us who were getting these jobs were very qualified, probably overqualified. Because we had experience, and we had college degrees."

She added that with the recent changes coming down from the Oval Office, everything seems "frightening."

Reid gave an example, noting her cousin recently lost his job in Chicago because of the DEI mandates.

"He had no notice, nothing," Reid said. "He didn't receive any severance pay. They just came in and fired everybody. So, we really need organizations like the NAACP so we can make sure that justice and equality are for everybody. The NAACP is not just for Blacks. It's for everyone, and a lot of people don't understand that — it's for everyone."

Since she's retired, Reid said the DEI changes won't affect her as much as they will her children and grandchildren.

The recent loss of government jobs is affecting not only Black people but everyone, Reid said.

A Black History Month celebration will be hosted at 3 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 23, at True Vine Fellowship, at the corner of Morgan Street and W.T. Morris Avenue. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Don's has seven large wreckers on hand to sort out the biggest of accidents and tow whatever's left off the highway.

"There's times we get four of them big ones at once," Weaver said. "We've got seven of them right now, but one of them is for sale."

The bright yellow trucks are heavy and take an expert driver's touch, but their big tires help keep them on the road when others are slipping and sliding.

"We use Michelin Snow and Ice tires," Weaver said. "And we use tire chains on all of our wreckers whenever the roads get too bad and people can't get around."

Dustin Fields is wrecker operator who knows how important good tires are for traction in the snow and ice, but he noted there is another factor equally important to driving safely in hazardous conditions.

"It all depends too on a person's ability to drive," Fields said. "You know, some people can handle it, and some can't, that's a lot of it too."

Slowing down is frequently the best way to stay out of the ditches during a storm or on icy roads.

"There's a lot of them going too fast for the conditions," Weaver said.

This week Snow Emergency Routes were in effect across Sedalia where plowing efforts were increased, extra salt was applied and vehicles parked along the routes were encouraged to park elsewhere to enable easier snow removal.

er snow removal. Don's Towing was not on the rotation to tow vehicles parked along evacuation routes but noted the push had cleared most routes this storm. Fields asked for patience when drivers see the wrecker's flashing yellow lights.

"Just give each other time and don't get in no big hurry," Fields said. "And give us room to do our job, that's our biggest thing is people slowing down and giving us room to work."

Don's has a fleet of smaller wreckers when the larger trucks would be too much, but would often rather bring a big truck and have too much power than bring a small truck and need more.

"You have things that you get sent out to on our side, on the big truck side, where you wonder if we could have done it with a littler truck," Fields said. "But in the same token we got to keep our trucks up and

running and sometimes sending a smaller truck you run into tearing stuff up."

Weaver said his larger wreckers can handle anything being pulled down the road and are

equipped to easily clear even the largest of highway accidents.

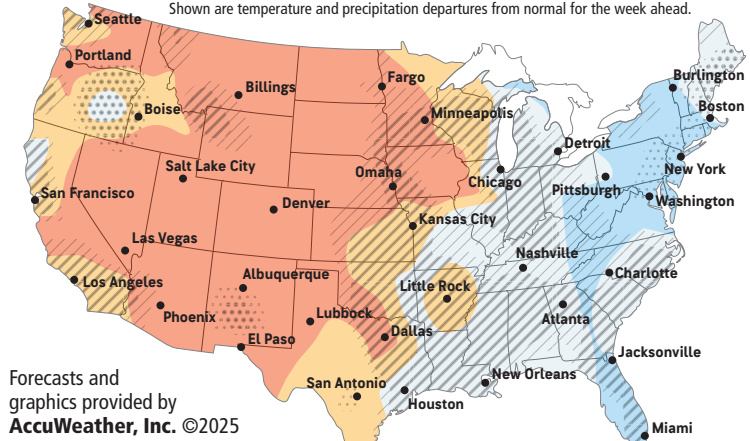

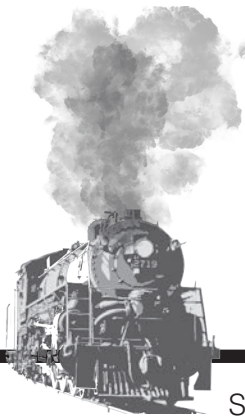

Class 1-3 district basketball tournaments set to tip off

The road to postseason glory is set for the area's high school basketball teams.

Class 1-3 district tournaments are set to begin Monday, Feb. 24, with the boys brackets followed by the girls brackets on Tuesday, Feb. 25.

Green Ridge will host the Class 1 District 7 Boys Tournament, while Windsor hosts the Class 3 District 13 Boys Tournament.

Sacred Heart, which ranks No. 6 in Class 1 in the most recent Missouri Basketball Coaches Association poll, enters the tournament in Green Ridge as the No. 1 seed. The Gremlins are looking to win their third district title in four years.

Class 1 District 8 Tournament.

Rough quarter dooms Smith-Cotton girls in loss to Helias Catholic

Smith-Cotton girls basketball had about as good of a first quarter as it could have asked for against Helias Catholic on Monday, Feb. 17.

The next eight minutes were a different story.

After gaining a 12-7 lead in the first period, the Lady Tigers were outscored 32-12 in the second quarter on their way to losing 72-45 at Helias Catholic High School.

Helias did most of its

damage from beyond the arc in the second quarter, as it sank six 3-pointers in the period. Senior Alaina Meyer made five of them.

"The last two ball games, the same thing has happened," Smith-Cotton head coach Ron Rhodes said, referring to the Lady Tigers' 67-44 loss to Boonville on Feb. 14. "The other team gets a hot shooter and knocks them down, and I think she knocked down like five of them. The other night against Boonville, you know, same girl, same spot, and she knocked down about five of them. We just can't

seem to locate their shooters before they shoot and that's been an issue."

Meyer opened the second quarter with a 3-pointer, which sparked a 7-0 run by the Lady Crusaders (13-9, 3-1 CMAC) to give them their first lead of the game at 14-12.

Freshman Mia Cavanaugh made two free throws to tie the game back up at 14, but Helias responded with a 13-4 run to take a 27-18 lead. Meyer drained three triples during the stretch, while senior Kenadi Harrison added another.

Royals, Ragans agree on three-year extension

SURPRISE, Ariz. — All-Star left-hander Cole Ragans and the Kansas City Royals agreed Friday to a \$13.25 million, three-year contract.

Ragans gets a \$250,000 signing bonus and salaries of \$1 million this year, \$4.5 million in 2026 and \$7.5 million in 2027. His 2027 salary would escalate to \$8 million if he wins a Cy Young Award in either 2025 or 2026.

Ragans, 27, remains eligible for salary arbitration after the 2027 season and can become a free agent after the 2028 World Series.

“He earned this contract through his hard work, perseverance and professionalism,” Royals general manager J.J. Picollo said in a statement. “He’s been an outstanding performer for us at a young age and his success is motivating to us moving forward.”

Ragans was 11-9 with a 3.14 ERA in 32 starts last year with 223 strikeouts and 67 walks in 186 1/3 innings. He led AL qualified pitchers with an average of 10.77 strikeouts per nine innings and finished fourth in Cy Young voting.

He is 18-17 with a 3.46 ERA in 53 starts and 17 relief appearances over four seasons, including 16-11 with a 3.00 ERA in 44 starts since Kansas City acquired him from Texas on June 30, 2023, for reliever Aroldis Chapman, who helped the Rangers win their first World Series title that fall.

Spurs star Wembanyama likely to miss rest of season after blood clot diagnosis

San Antonio star Victor Wembanyama's season is likely over after he was diagnosed with a blood clot in his right shoulder, a condition that will sideline one of the league's brightest stars and is the second massive health-related hit for the Spurs in a matter of months.

Wembanyama is beginning treatment immediately and the Spurs are working under the expectation that the 7-foot-3 center from France will fully recover, said a person with knowledge of the situation who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because those details were not released publicly.

It may even be possible for Wembanyama — the NBA's leading shot-blocker this season and a first-time All-Star — to play this summer for France in the European championships if he chooses, the person said.

“You can't replace Vic,” Spurs guard Chris Paul said. “I can't stand on a guy's shoulders and block every shot that comes to the rim. Aside from his basketball ability, his charisma and what he brings into the locker room, I think, is what we'll miss the most.”

Wembanyama's condition — deep vein thrombosis — was diagnosed this week after he returned from the All-Star Game, the Spurs said Thursday. It is almost always treated with blood-thinning medication, and players in contact sports such as basketball have long been advised to avoid playing while using such medication because of the heightened chance of bleeding.

Wembanyama's diagnosis comes about 3 1/2 months after Spurs coach Gregg Popovich had a stroke and was forced to take a leave from the sideline, with assistant coach Mitch Johnson serving as acting coach ever since. The Spurs have said Popo-

vich's condition is improving, but there is no timetable for his return to the bench.

“Man, it's been extremely tough, to say the least,” Paul said. “This organization, how they put everything into perspective. Obviously, the Pop situation, knowing what he means to the league and Vic, him playing his first All-Star Game ... for us, we know we've got a job to do but just like anybody we worry about our people.”

Wembanyama was the league's rookie of the year last season and the frontrunner to be defensive player of the year this season. He has already taken 403 3-pointers and blocked 176 shots this season — no player in NBA history has ever finished a season with those numbers, and Wembanyama did it this year by the All-Star break.

He is averaging 24.3 points, 11 rebounds, 3.8 blocks and 3.7 assists; the only other player to finish a season averaging all that was Kareem Abdul-Jabbar in 1975-76. The Spurs open their post-All-Star schedule later Thursday in Austin, Texas, against the Phoenix Suns. Wembanyama had been listed as doubtful for that game

because of illness.

Miami Heat forward Kevin Love, who learned of Wembanyama's situation as he walked off the practice floor Thursday, said he was in “absolute shock.”

“First of all, you pray for him. You hope for the best, personally and professionally,” Love said. “He means so much to the league. He's an incredible competitor and he has a runway to be the face of the league for the next 20 years. I can't imagine this league without him in the short term or in the long term. He's that important.”

Such cases have affected NBA players before, including now-retired Hall of Famer Chris Bosh — whose career was cut short after he was diagnosed with blood clots while playing with Miami. Brandon Ingram, now with the Toronto Raptors, had his 2018-19 season end early because of deep vein thrombosis when he was with the Los Angeles Lakers, and Detroit's Auser Thompson had a clot issue that saw him miss the end of the 2023-24 season.

The question for the Spurs' medical team to answer now surrounds why this happened

to Wembanyama.

“Any time we have upper extremity or arm blood clots, we always need to ask ourselves why they happened,” said Dr. Geoffrey Barnes, an associate professor of cardiology and vascular medicine at the University of Michigan. “And so, looking for the cause is going to be a really important piece of this. ... It's really important to understand why this happened, because then that'll dictate what the treatments are and what the long term consequences may be.”

Some athletes have come back, sometimes better than ever, after dealing with blood clots.

Serena Williams was diagnosed with the problem known as a pulmonary embolism — a clot on the lung — in 2011, and was the dominant women's tennis player in the world again when she returned.

“Scariest thing I ever experienced,” Williams said months after returning.

Wembanyama — the No. 1 pick in the 2023 draft — is widely considered the brightest young star in the game, someone who led France to the silver medal at last year's Paris Olympics.

No. 15 Mizzou explodes in win over No. 4 Alabama

COLUMBIA, Mo. — No. 15 Missouri men's basketball set a conference-play program record by scoring 110 points in its win over No. 4 Alabama on Wednesday, Feb. 19.

Mark Mitchell scored a career-high 31 points, Caleb Grill had 25 points and matched his career high with 10 rebounds, as the Tigers handed the Crimson Tide their second straight loss, 110-98.

Anthony Robinson II added 14 points, and Tamar Bates had 13 to help Missouri (20-6, 9-4 Southeastern Conference) win its third straight and improve to 5-3 against ranked teams.

"I'm proud of the way we started and ended the game," Missouri head coach Dennis Gates said. Missouri opened on a 12-0 run forcing Alabama coach Nate Oats to call a timeout just 2:28 into the contest, and outscored the Crimson Tide 59-46 in the first half.

The Tigers shot 61.1% from the field and 42.9% from 3-point range in the

first half.

Through the first eight minutes of the second stanza, Missouri's lead teetered between 10 and 15 points as each team efficiently got to the charity stripe.

The Tide came within single digits at 74-65 with 11 minutes left to play, and continued to push down the stretch.

A 3-pointer drew Alabama within six before a Trent Pierce bucket and a Mitchell and-one ignited a 9-0 Tiger run, giving Missouri an 88-73 advantage at the under eight timeout.

From there, 13 of Missouri's final 18 points came from the charity stripe to clinch the win.

Game wide, the Tigers shot 60.3% from the field and 39.1% from deep compared to the Tide's 53.8% from the field and 41.9% from deep.

"We came here to fight today," Mitchell told the SEC Network postgame. "We knew they were going to be a good team. We knew what we worked on. We knew we were going to fight, we knew we were going to compete. We don't

care about rankings. We're just going to do what we do, man."

Gates headed off a court-storming celebration by taking the public address microphone and imploring the crowd to stay back. "Please, do not

rush the court! Please, do not rush the court!" Gates said to the fans.

Mark Sears scored a season-best 35 points for Alabama (21-5, 10-3 SEC), coming off a home loss to top-ranked Auburn in a 1-2 matchup. Mouhamed

Dioubate added 13 points and 10 rebounds before fouling out.

Both teams return to the court Saturday, Feb. 22. Alabama hosts No. 2 Florida, and Missouri is at Arkansas.

"We can do anything

we want to do," Mitchell said. "We're one of the best teams in the country. Not a lot of people believed in us, but the proof is in the pudding in what we've been doing. I think they'll just have to start to realize what we are."

Women's hoops scoreboard: No. 5 UConn beats Seton Hall

SOUTH ORANGE, N.J. — Paige Bueckers had 23 points, nine rebounds and five assists to lead No. 5 UConn to a 91-49 victory over Seton Hall on Wednesday night, the Huskies' 41st straight victory over the Pirates.

UConn last lost to Seton Hall on Jan. 5th, 1994.

Bueckers, who scored at least 20 points for the 14th time this season, moved past Diana Taurasi and into ninth place on UConn's career scoring list with 2,166 points.

Kaitlyn Chen and Aubrey Griffin each scored 15 points, Ashlynn Shade added 14 points and Sarah Strong 10 for UConn (25-3, 15-0 Big East), which won its fourth straight game since losing to Tennessee 80-76 on Feb. 6th.

Yaya Lops scored 15 points and Jada Eads and Faith Masonius added 12 apiece for Seton Hall (18-8, 10-5).

LOS ANGELES — Juju Watkins scored 28 points, Kiki Iriafen added 24 points and 10 rebounds and fourth-ranked Southern California defeated No. 22 Michigan State.

Watkins, who leads the Big Ten in scoring at 24.3 points per game, has six games this season with at least 28 points for the Trojans (24-2, 14-1 Big Ten), who are 7-1 against ranked teams.

Grace VanSlooten tied a career high with 29 points and Julia Ayrault had 16 points and 10 rebounds for Michigan State (19-7, 9-6), which fell to 2-4 against ranked teams. The Spartans lost at then top-ranked UCLA 75-69 on Sunday.

USC had a 21-point lead late in the third quarter before Michigan State made things interesting in the fourth. The Spartans went on a 15-4 run to get within 74-68 with four minutes remaining before a jumper by Kennedy Smith and fast break

NO. 10 TCU 82, ARIZONA ST. 66

TEMPE, Ariz. — Madison Conner scored all of her 22 points in the second half, Sedona Prince added 17 and No. 10 TCU overcame a rare off night from 3-point distance to beat Arizona State.

The Horned Frogs (25-3, 13-2 Big 12) returned to the top 10 this week behind the nation's most prolific 3-point-shooting team. TCU labored from the arc against Arizona State (8-19, 2-13), shooting 7 of 22 to allow the Sun Devils to hang around well into the fourth quarter.

Conner helped the Horned Frogs put the game away, hitting three 3s in the fourth quarter. She went 4 of 10 from 3 to reach 101 for the season, breaking the school record she set a year ago.

TCU shot 56% overall and has won four straight to tie the school record for wins in a season, set twice previously.

Jailah Donald scored with 11 seconds left to cut the lead to three and St. John's got the ball back after Kiani Lockett missed two free throws with eight seconds remaining, but Donald missed a final 3-point attempt.

Jensen scored 16 points with Molly Mogensen adding 11 for the Bluejays, who swept the season series.

No. 23 Kansas' struggles reach low point in loss to BYU

PROVO, Utah — Kansas has reached a low point with its uncharacteristic struggles in Big 12 play.

The No. 23 Jayhawks lost 91-57 to BYU on Tuesday night, matching their largest margin of defeat in Bill Self's tenure, after previously losing 85-51 to USC in the second round of the 2021 NCAA Tournament. It also marked the first time Kansas — the preseason No. 1 in the AP Top 25 poll — lost by 30-plus points against an unranked team since the poll began in 1948.

The Jayhawks have not led through their last 80 minutes of basketball after also falling to Utah 74-67 on Saturday. They have lost four of six games since the start of February.

"Obviously we're going to catch a lot of flak, whether it's fans or national media, and rightfully so because we just lost by damn near 40," said senior center Hunter Dickinson, who finished with 12 points and 14 rebounds. "Nobody is going to feel bad for us now that NIL is the thing, and players are getting paid and everything like that. Nobody is going to feel bad for you. They're going to expect you to perform like a paid player."

Kansas never came close to threatening the Cougars at any point. BYU shot 52% from the field

and made 14 3-pointers en route to notching its third straight victory.

"We were one foot in and one foot out in how we guarded and a lot of other things right from the jump," Self said. "It was crystal clear how we wanted to try to guard them and right from the jump we doubted and ended up hurting ourselves."

BYU finished with 24 assists and 14 steals. It marked the first game against a ranked opponent over the last 25 seasons where the Cougars totaled more than 20 assists and 10 steals.

"I think BYU could have beat anyone tonight," Self said. "They were great and then we didn't do anything to make them play less than great."

The Cougars looked impressive on both ends of the court en route to moving into fifth place in the Big 12 standings.

They had 15 assists on 15 baskets in the first half and forced eight turnovers on their way to building a 20-point halftime lead. BYU led by as many as 38 points after halftime.

It is a statement win for the Cougars as much as a statement loss for the Jayhawks. BYU started 2-4 in Big 12 play but has won seven of nine since.

"We've been waiting for a win against a really storied program and a team that's good," BYU coach Kevin Young said. "Tonight was impressive by how our guys carried out the game plan on both ends of the floor."

Robot umpires are getting their first MLB test during spring training

TAMPA, Fla. — A computerized system that calls balls and strikes is being tested during Major League Baseball spring training exhibition games starting Thursday after four years of experiments in the minor leagues.

Baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred is an advocate of the Automated Ball-Strike System, which potentially as early as 2026 could be used to aid MLB home plate umpires, but not replace them.

Starting in 2024, MLB focused testing on a challenge system in which the human umpire makes each original call. Data from the spring training test could cause MLB to make alterations to the system for Triple-A games this season.

How does the Automated Ball-Strike System work?

Stadiums are outfitted with cameras that track each pitch and judge whether it crossed home plate within the strike zone. In early testing, umpires wore ear buds and would hear "ball" or "strike," then relay that to players and fans with traditional hand signals.

The challenge system adds a wrinkle. During spring training, human umpires will call every pitch, but each team will have the ability to challenge two calls per game, with no additions for extra innings. A team retains its challenge if successful, similar to the regulations for big league teams with video reviews, which were first used for home run calls in August 2008 and widely expanded to many calls for the 2014 season.

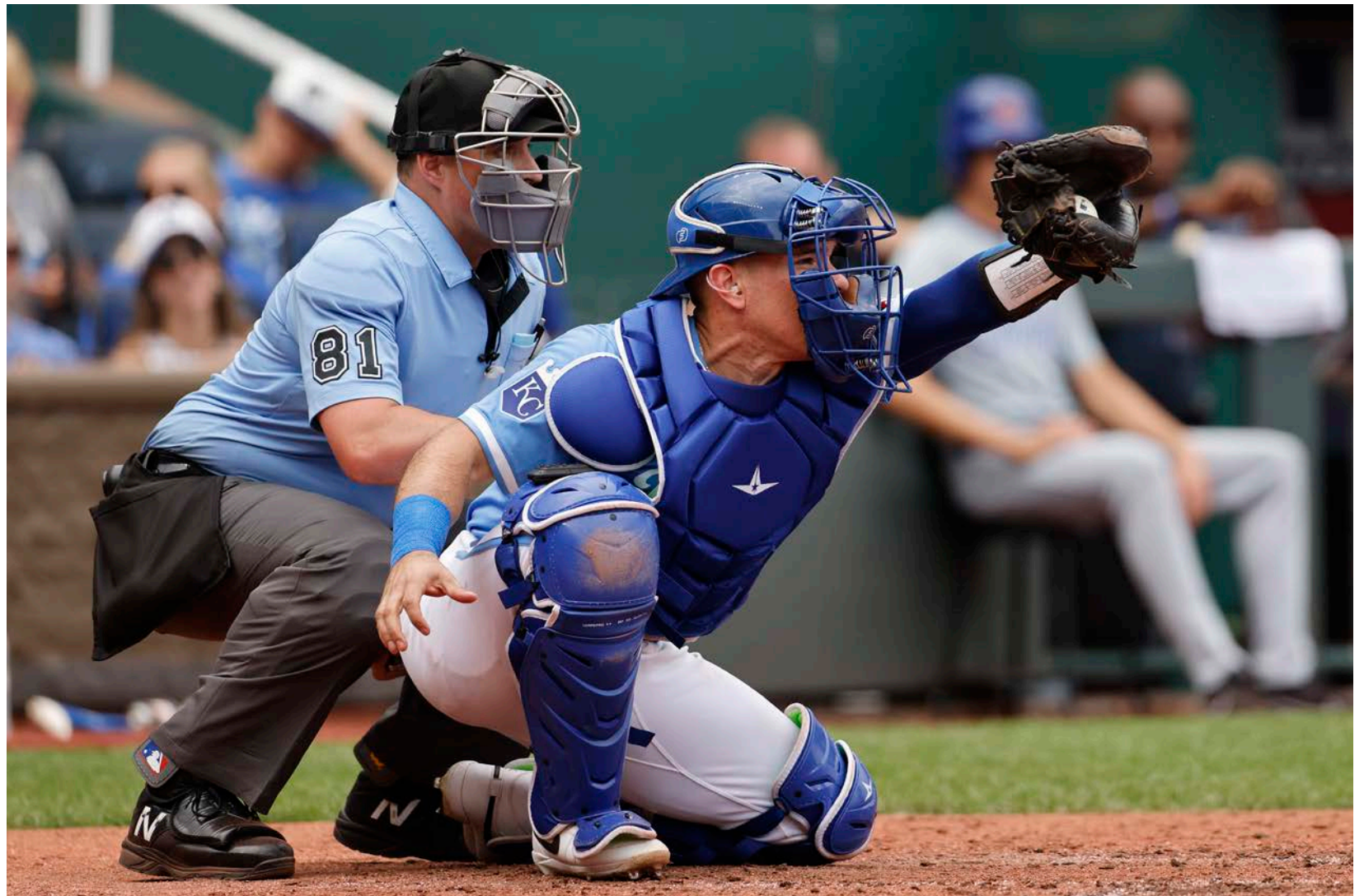
Only a batter, pitcher or catcher may challenge a call, signaling with the tap of a helmet or cap; and assistance from the dugout is not allowed. A challenge must be made within 2 seconds, and the graphic of the pitch and strike zone will be shown on the scoreboard and broadcast feed. The umpire then announces the updated count.

MLB estimates the process averages 17 seconds.

Where will ABS be tested?

MLB has installed the system in 13 spring training ballparks that are home to 19 teams. The Florida stadiums, all in the Florida State League, are the stadiums of Detroit, Minnesota, the New York Mets, New York Yankees, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and Toronto, plus the ball-park shared by Miami and St. Louis.

Five test sites in Arizona all are shared: the Diamondbacks/Colorado, Chicago White Sox/Los Angeles Dodgers, Cleveland/Cincinnati, Kansas

City/Texas and Seattle/San Diego.

About 60% of spring training games are slated for trial, although teams could play vastly different numbers of games with ABS testing. The Diamondbacks are slated for 29 ABS games, while the Cubs have just seven.

What is the technology?

A Hawk-Eye pose-tracking system of cameras was installed and used to track pitches and whether they are within a strike zone based on the height of each batter, who is measured without shoes before a team's first test game. MLB estimated the calibration process at less than one minute for each player.

There are eight cameras at most of the spring training ballparks in the test and 12 at the Diamondbacks/Rockies stadium.

While the strike zone actually called by big league umpires tends to be oval in shape, the ABS strike zone is a rectangle, as in the rule book.

Developing a consensus on what a computer strike zone should be has been an issue.

When did MLB first start using ABS?

MLB started experimenting with ball/strike technology at the independent Atlantic League in 2019.

A challenge system was tried in 2021 at eight of nine ballparks that make up the Florida State League. ABS was promoted to five Triple-A parks in 2022 and expanded to all Triple-A stadiums in 2023, the robot alone for the first three games of each series and a human with a challenge system in the final three. That system

was in place at the start of 2024, but MLB switched to an all-challenge system last June 25.

How successful were teams with challenges last year?

Overall return rate over the full Triple-A season was 51%, with challenges by the defense winning 54% and by the offense winning 48%. Challenges with the two-challenge limit in place averaged 3.9 per game, including 2.2 by the offense.

The success percentage has been slightly better for video reviews in the major leagues. Teams increased their success rate on video reviews to 53.7% last season, led by the Boston Red Sox at 67.9%.

Just 1.6% of first pitches were challenges, but the figure increased to 3.9% for two-strike pitches, 5.2% for three-ball pitches and 8.2% for full counts.

Challenge percentages were more likely later in the game. While 1.9% of pitches were challenged in the first three innings, 2.5% were challenged from the fourth through the sixth, 2.8% in the seventh and eighth and 3.6% in the ninth.

How has the computer strike zone changed over time?

MLB has changed the shape of the ABS strike zone several times.

It started with a 19-inch width in 2022, then dropped it to 17 inches — matching the width of home plate. Narrowing the strike zone led to an increase in walks and only small changes in strikeout rates.

The top of the strike zone was 51% of a batter's height in 2022 and 2023, then raised to 53.5% in 2024 after pitchers' com-

plaints the top had been too low. The bottom of the strike zone has been 27% since 2022 after initially being set at 28%.

A batter's stance is not taken into account.

ABS makes the ball/strike decision at the midpoint of the plate, 8 1/2 inches from the front and 8 1/2 inches from the back. The contrasts with the rule book zone called by umpires, which says the zone is a cube, and a strike is a pitch that crosses any

part.

Strikeout rates increased 0.5% and walk rates rose 1% in full ABS games and 0.8% in challenge games.

How will ABS impact broadcasts?

Concerned the strike zone box on broadcasts could tip whether to challenge and cause fans to yell at players to challenge, MLB plans to experiment with several broadcast alternatives, among them: show the box but not the

ball; show the ball but not the box; and to show only corners of the box.

How can players give feedback?

Dugout iPads available to all teams will have an application called Pro-TABS that allows players to check pitches against their individual strike zone. Information will update after every plate appearance and players can give MLB comment on single pitches and the overall system.

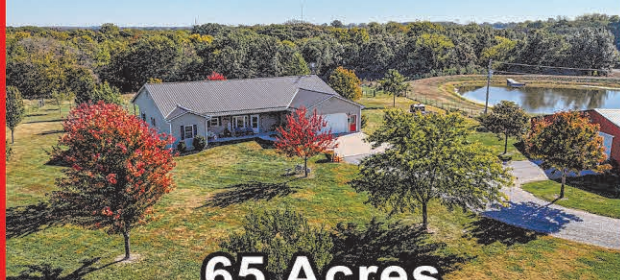

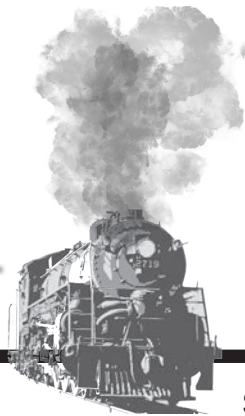

A certain idea of life in freedom

Freedom. America was built on the idea of freedom. It was built on the lives of those who sacrificed everything so we could remain free. So, what's happened to us?

In 2023, I went to Wroclaw, Poland, on a humanitarian trip to help Ukrainian refugees at a Polish church help point. At that time, America was all about helping Ukraine and its people, which Russia had invaded on Feb. 24, 2022.

We all remember those striking images of mothers and children escaping on trains out of Ukraine as Russia began its invasion. Little children holding teddy bears and toys. Women leaving behind their husbands, fathers, sons and brothers to fight for their country. We rallied behind them, prayed for them and their country and many of us thought, 'What if this was us?' — then something changed.

So, as Americans, are we supposed to turn our heads and believe what the current U.S. Administration is saying? What is the freedom to us? We are being told that Ukraine began the war and that its President, Volodymyr Zelenskyy, is a dictator. I can't wrap my head around that. As I've said, I don't write about politics, but I have to say something.

Peace talks about ending the war are ongoing between the U.S. and Russia, but Ukraine and the European Union are not involved. According to ABC News and Fox News, National Security Adviser Mike Waltz said on Thursday, Feb. 20, that officials in Kyiv "need to tone it down" after talks between President Trump and President Zelenskyy about a deal to end the invasion went sideways.

Who are we now as a nation? Author and Yale Professor Timothy Snyder recently wrote an article, "Crossing the Line," while riding the train from Kyiv to Zaporizhzhia, Ukraine, about the war between Russia and Ukraine. He noted that the Ukrainians on the Russian-occupied side of the line had to be in tow with Russian ideology. They had to subscribe to Russian political beliefs or be killed or tortured. He added often, their children are removed and sent to Russian homes to be raised, children who will not know their motherland. He said Ukrainians "are fighting not only for their lives but for a certain idea of life in freedom."

He also said the Ukrainians living on the opposite side of the line, the unoccupied side, are freer than their U.S. counterparts nowadays. Snyder added that considering recent events in U.S. thinking, Russia is happy with how American politicians are crawling into bed with them.

In time for International Women's Day, The Liberty Center presents 'Silent Sky'

For most, Henrietta Swan Leavitt is not a household name. Despite vast contributions to the field of astronomy, for years, much of her work was lost to history. "Silent Sky"—a play depicting Leavitt's life—looks to rectify that.

"We see what was expected of a woman in the beginning of the twentieth century, and this progressive movement for a woman not to marry, not to have children," director Suzanne Peterson said. "Henrietta took her dowry and left home in order to go to Harvard and work at the Observatory."

Finding an actress to capture the dogged curiosity of Leavitt came in the form of Alex Sword.

"My actress who's playing Henrietta is fantastic. She came in and I just knew right off the bat: 'That's my Henrietta,'" Peterson said. "I have an amazing cast of five people who are able to use their voices and facial expressions and interactions with one another to really keep their audience engaged."

Historical accuracy was likewise vital to Peterson's cast and crew. Assistant director Jessica Jones even took pains to give the actresses assignments to further explore their characters.

"It's really fun to figure out who your character is and all of that, but these are real people, and we want to do justice to them," Peterson said. "They had to look these women up and really see who they were. (Jones) came up with three pages of questions on the backstory of characters and made my girls do homework—like what would their favorite quote be? What would they like to do? It was very cool that Jess had them do that. It was like filling in the blanks."

This is not to say each character is a true figure of the past; Margaret Leavitt (Trinady Klemme) is likely an amalgamation of several of Henrietta's sisters. Their relationship serves as a juxtaposition between

motherhood and career, an issue that remains arguably prevalent today.

Peterson Shaw (James Jones) plays a love interest, and moreover, an initially doubtful male colleague who dismisses Henrietta

until her intelligence can't be denied. In real life, Leavitt worked alongside two other notable females, Annie Jump Cannon (DyNisha Hawkins) and Williamina Fleming (Jan Bahner). Recruited by Harvard College

Observatory astronomer Edward Pickering, the three women were referred to as "Harvard computers," their primary task cataloging the night sky.



Eternal investments, are we hot, cold, or lukewarm?

Republicans renew push to enact work requirements for Missouri Medicaid recipients

A proposed constitutional amendment that would impose work and reporting requirements on Missouri Medicaid recipients was debated in a state Senate committee Wednesday morning.

Sponsored by state Sen. Jill Carter, a Joplin Republican, the proposed constitutional amendment would require able-bodied Medicaid participants ages 19 to 49 to prove they are working or engaging in another qualifying activity as a condition for receiving health coverage.

Participants would need to complete 80 hours a month of work, education, job search, child care or volunteering. There would be various exceptions, including for those who are pregnant or primary caregivers to a dependent child or dependent adult.

If passed by the legislature, it would be placed on the statewide ballot and need voter approval to go into law.

"This is an amendment that is similar to what the federal government is kind of pivoting to," Carter said at the Senate's Families, Seniors and Health committee hearing, "just trying to help people be more involved and engaged in the communities where they are receiving assistance."

At the federal level, Republicans in Congress have said they're eyeing work requirements for Medicaid, as well as deep cuts to the program. The last Trump administration encouraged state-level efforts to condition Medicaid on work and reporting requirements, and the second administration has shown interest in similar policies.

Carter said her bill is designed to help empower able-bodied Medicaid participants to better themselves by getting involved

in their communities and escaping poverty.

"I see how poverty is and getting assistance is becoming a multi-generational cycle," she said. "Instead of us helping people get out of that cycle of poverty, we're capping them and keeping them entrapped in that."

No one testified in favor of the bill Wednesday. Five people testified in opposition, arguing the requirements would amount to bureaucratic red tape that would cause the neediest Missourians to lose health care.

According to the health policy organization KFF, two-thirds of adults on Medicaid age 19-64 already work.

Low-income Missourians, along with those with disabilities, qualify for Medicaid. For a two-person household of low-income adults without disabilities, for example, the annual income limit is \$27,185 to qualify.

Emily Kalmer, a lobbyist for the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network, said the proposal could drop cancer survivors and patients from the rolls who are unable to work.

"For a cancer patient losing coverage in the middle of treatment — that could seriously jeopardize their chances of survival," she said.

Kalmer said although the exemptions may be "well meaning and intended to help," in practice, those who qualify could still lose coverage due to administrative hurdles.

In Arkansas, where work requirements were briefly implemented, Kalmer said people intended to be exempt from work requirements still lost coverage because they didn't know about the exemptions or weren't able to navigate the reporting requirements.

Arkansas was the first state to adopt Medicaid

work requirements in 2018. Until a court halted the program in 2019, around 18,000 people lost coverage.

Brian Colby, vice president of public policy at the progressive Missouri Budget Project, said other states' experiences have shown that "this administrative task is very expensive, very hard to do and gets mixed up in court and the whole thing gets thrown out."

Lucas Caldwell-McMillan, chief of policy staff with the anti-poverty organization Empower Missouri, said the proposal would add an "incredible extra layer of bureaucracy" onto an already-strained social services system.

"Social Services is struggling right now answering phone calls," he said. "This would be a pretty dramatic increase: hundreds of thousands of folks, hundreds of thousands of forms, processes, people who need to call with questions, need to figure out which form they need to submit, get into the local office or get a hold of someone onto the phone."

Missouri House debate shows GOP split over bill to protect pesticide makers

A bill to protect one of the world's largest chemical companies from charges it didn't warn customers that one of its most popular products causes cancer won first-round approval Tuesday in the Missouri House.

The legislation, sponsored by Republican state Rep. Dane Diehl of Butler, would make the label required by federal pesticide regulators "sufficient to satisfy any requirement for a warning label regarding cancer under any other provision of current law."

"This bill is going to put a process that has been around since 1947 as the gold standard," for pesticide labeling, Diehl said.

The bill passed on a voice vote so there was no test of whether it had enough support to win a majority in the 163-member House. The debate showed Republicans are not united on the bill.

"I can't sit by and let a bottle of a poisonous chemical just show up on the shelf where people can go, 'Okay, actually, you know what? The EPA label is on there. We're good,'" said state Rep. Mark Mathiesen, a Republican from O'Fallon.

The immediate beneficiary of the bill would be Bayer, the German-based company that has its U.S.

headquarters in St. Louis. Bayer makes Roundup, the brand-name glyphosate herbicide created by Monsanto, which Bayer acquired in 2018.

There are more than 25,000 lawsuits pending in Cole County against Bayer that allege glyphosate caused the plaintiff's non-Hodgkin's lymphoma and failed to warn them about the potential danger. In 2023 Cole County, three plaintiffs were awarded \$1.56 billion, though a judge later reduced that to \$622 million.

There are tens of thousands of additional lawsuits pending across the country and Bayer has paid out at least \$10 billion for jury awards and settlements.

Many backers of the bill focused on the lawsuits as a symptom of out-of-control litigation, blaming trial attorneys, who usually receive a substantial percentage of payouts in personal injury lawsuits.

"They earn a lot of money, Mr. Speaker, preying on the people of the state of Missouri," said state Rep. Dean Van Schoiack, a Republican from Savannah.

For state Rep. LaDonna Appelbaum, a Democrat from St. Louis, the bad actor is Bayer. Appelbaum told the House she has stage 4 cancer and has never heard anything from Bayer, which is located in her district, explaining why the company backs the bill.

"Does anyone see this mark on the side of my face?" Appelbaum said. "It's a slap. It's a slap in the face."

Bayer isn't just relying on lobbying presence to make its case. Since late last year, an organization called the Modern Ag Alliance has spent tens of thousands of dollars to influence the legislature, airing radio ads in the St. Louis, Springfield, Joplin and central Missouri markets that portray glyphosate as a benign benefactor of humankind.

Roundup and products like it make no-till farming possible, said state Rep. Kent Haden, a Republican from Mexico.

"You take away these

products and my next question is, how many in this body would like to go back to work in the fields and pulling weeds?" Haden said.

Better labeling to avoid lawsuits isn't so costly that it will force Roundup or glyphosate-based products off the market, said state Rep. Adrian Plank, a Democrat from Columbia.

"This keeps Missourians from having their due process in court," Plank said. "That's what this bill does."

Glyphosate is one of the most widely used herbicide chemicals in the world and is a key ingredient in hundreds of products. Large amounts of Round-

up and other glyphosate brands are made in China, which dominates the world market for herbicides and many fertilizers.

In the state Senate, that domination has attracted the attention of state Sen. Brad Hudson, a Republican from Cape Fair, who wants to ban the sale of Chinese-made pesticides in the state.

"This is a simple, common sense bill that demonstrates my love for our country and my opposition to foreign interference in our food supply and pesticide markets," Hudson said in a news release.

No hearing has been scheduled for Hudson's bill.

The key vote on Diehl's bill will likely come Thursday, when the House generally acts on bills given initial approval earlier in the week. Last year, an identical bill passed 91-57, nine votes more than the 82 votes required for passage, but failed in the state Senate.

The vote isn't clear-cut, said state Rep. Darin Chappell, a Republican from Rogersville.

"Nobody on either side of this," Chappell said, "is somebody we all want to embrace and cuddle up to and say, absolutely, these are the ones with the purest, wind-driven snow hands on this deal."

Trump administration moves to rehire terminated USDA Scientists

The Trump administration is working to rehire a group of scientists at the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) who were mistakenly terminated amid a wave of federal workforce reductions.

The affected employees were responsible for critical research and response efforts related to the ongoing avian influenza outbreak, which has significantly impacted the poultry industry.

The layoffs occurred as part of broader cost-cutting measures initiated under the Department of Government Efficiency,

a newly created agency tasked with streamlining federal operations. However, the unintended consequences of these reductions became evident as the USDA struggled to contain the virus without key personnel.

In a statement, the USDA said "USDA continues to prioritize the response to highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI). Several job categories, including veterinarians, animal health technicians, and other emergency response personnel have been exempted from the recent personnel actions to continue to support the HPAI response and other animal health priorities."

Efforts to rehire the terminated scientists have been expedited following mounting concerns from lawmakers, industry leaders, and public health officials. The administration has directed USDA leadership to reinstate as many of the affected researchers as possible and to ensure that future workforce adjustments do not disrupt essential disease prevention programs. "Although several positions supporting HPAI were notified of their terminations over the weekend, we are working to swiftly rectify the situation and rescind those letters," the USDA also said in their statement.

The USDA has acknowledged the disruption

caused by the terminations and has begun reaching out to former employees with offers to return. Officials are also considering policy changes to prevent similar missteps in the future, including enhanced internal review processes before enacting workforce reductions in critical areas.

The avian influenza outbreak has led to increased egg prices and concerns about food security, making the swift reinstatement of scientific personnel a priority. Without these experts, the USDA's ability to monitor and respond to the virus has been significantly weakened, leading to delays in containment efforts.

Industry leaders have

welcomed the decision to rehire the scientists, emphasizing that their expertise is essential for controlling the outbreak and developing long-term strategies to prevent future incidents. Many have also called for additional funding to support USDA research initiatives, ensuring that resources remain available to combat emerging threats to the agricultural sector. Also a part of their statement, the USDA says that "USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service frontline positions are considered public safety positions, and we are continuing to hire the workforce necessary to ensure the safety and adequate supply of food to fulfill our

statutory mission".

The administration's move to correct the staffing issue highlights the challenges of balancing government efficiency with maintaining essential services. As officials work to reinstate the researchers, the focus will remain on strengthening the nation's response to avian influenza and preventing further economic disruption in the agricultural industry. As public concerns begin to mount, the response to this virus will affect both poultry farmers and consumers, as we are seeing populations be killed off by the virus and demand for eggs skyrocket while supply plummets.

Overcome poor soil, lack of space with straw bale gardening

You can't grow turkey in the straw, but you can grow side dishes and floral centerpieces for a turkey dinner in the straw.

Straw bale gardens are becoming popular with growers who are plagued with poor soil or limited garden space, said University of Missouri Extension horticulturist David Trinklein. Straw bale gardening combines container gardening and raised-bed gardening into one green-thumb package.

You can grow many vegetables, fruits and flowers in a straw bale garden, Trinklein said. Cool-season varieties can be planted as early as mid-March if you cover plants with protective materials such as clear plastic or floating row cover.

Use bales of straw, not hay, for gardening, he said. Hay contains weed seeds

and usually is too dense for best results. Choose bales held together tightly with twine. Farmers and local farm supply stores are good sources for straw. Avoid bales made from wheat or oats treated with an herbicide during production.

To assemble a straw bale garden, first choose a location that gets at least six to eight hours of direct sun. Once bales are watered, they become heavy and hard to move. If you place bales on the ground, Trinklein suggests putting them on a base of thick layers of newspaper to control weeds. Set bales so that twine is on the outside and cut ends are face up. Place bales in single rows to allow best access, air circulation and sun exposure.

Successful straw bale gardening begins with conditioning the bales.

This involves adding water and nitrogen to help bales partially decompose. Conditioning helps prevent nutrient tie-up once plants are added, Trinklein said.

Nitrogen deficiency is common in straw bale gardening. This happens when the soil microbes take nitrogen away from garden plants as they break down the organic matter in straw. If leaves turn yellow, you need to add more nitrogen.

To condition bales, soak them with water daily for 12 days. On days 1, 3 and 5, add ½ cup of a high-nitrogen fertilizer such as urea, ammonium nitrate or a lawn fertilizer to each bale. If using lawn fertilizer, make sure it is not the "weed and feed" type, which contains herbicides that would harm garden plants.

Continue to water to

activate the microbes and break down the straw. On days 7 and 9, add only ¼ cup high-nitrogen fertilizer. On the 11th day, add 1 cup of a general-purpose fertilizer such as a 12-12-12 mix to each bale.

After the 12th day, touch the bale to check for heat. If it is cool to touch, you can plant.

To plant, dig small pockets or holes into the straw and set plants into the holes. Fill the holes with soilless medium and cover the plant's roots. Water the base of the plant to settle the medium around the root system.

If planting seeds, put a layer of sterile potting media on top of the bale and tamp it down into the bale. Plant seeds according to package instructions.

Straw contains few nutrients, so feed the plants

regularly with a water-soluble liquid fertilizer solution. However, do not overfertilize plants growing in straw bales, Trinklein said. Otherwise, you end up with plants lush with abundant vegetative growth and little fruit. Too much nitrogen causes pollen abortion, and flowers fall off.

Be especially careful not to overfertilize vining crops such as cucumbers and melons. For sweeter-tasting melons, cut back on water when the fruits begin to size.

Keep bales adequately watered during the growing season. Drip lines or soaker hoses may be helpful and eliminate hand watering.

Straw bales provide conditions for good root growth, especially for tomatoes. You will see few weeds, but mushrooms may appear, Trinklein said. Dis-

card them. Earthworms like the nutrient-enriched bales and help plants thrive. You should see fewer pests than in conventional gardening.

Salad greens are a perfect choice for straw bale gardening, Trinklein said. You can enjoy greens up to frost, and even after frost with protection. Tomatoes, peppers and eggplant also grow well in straw.

Although space in a straw bale garden is limited, avoid the temptation to crowd plants. Space them as you would if growing in soil. MU Extension's "Vegetable Planting Calendar" (G6201) lists typical spacing for garden vegetables. It is available for download at <http://extension.missouri.edu/p/g6201>.

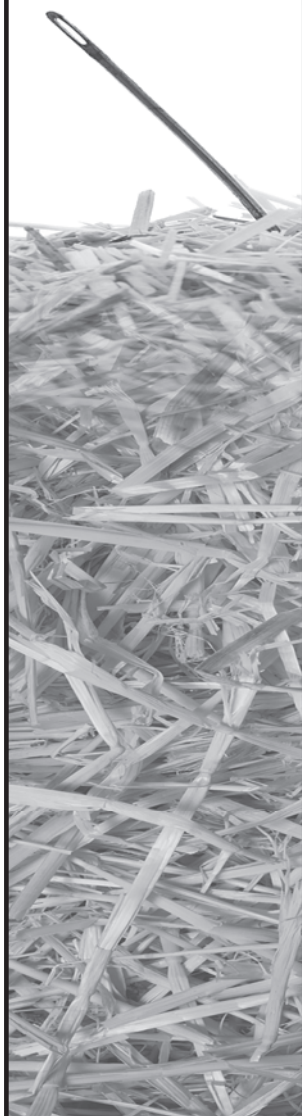

Their tool for studying celestial photos was aptly called a "fly spanker," an apparatus used to measure existing stars in the collection to newly-researched stars. While all three women depicted in "Silent Sky" made tremendous discoveries in their own right, Leavitt is today credited with the period-luminosity relationship—quite simply, a calculation which determined that the universe is likely infinite.
 "These women were just as bright, if not brighter, than these male astronomers. You know, the women did the

math for them.," Peterson said. "They were just used for the calculations. What else could they do? Now we know Henrietta Leavitt's discoveries are what helped build the Hubble telescope."
 Peterson cited "Silent Sky" as not only an imperative story for women, but science as a whole.
 "None of us knew—I had no idea. You hear the name Hubble, but you just don't hear these female names," she said. "(Leavitt) was really the first one to understand the vastness of outer space."
 "Silent Sky" runs Friday, March 7 and Saturday, March 8 at 7:30 with a Sunday, March 9 matinee at 2:00. Adult tickets are \$17 with senior tickets at \$15 and student tickets at \$12.

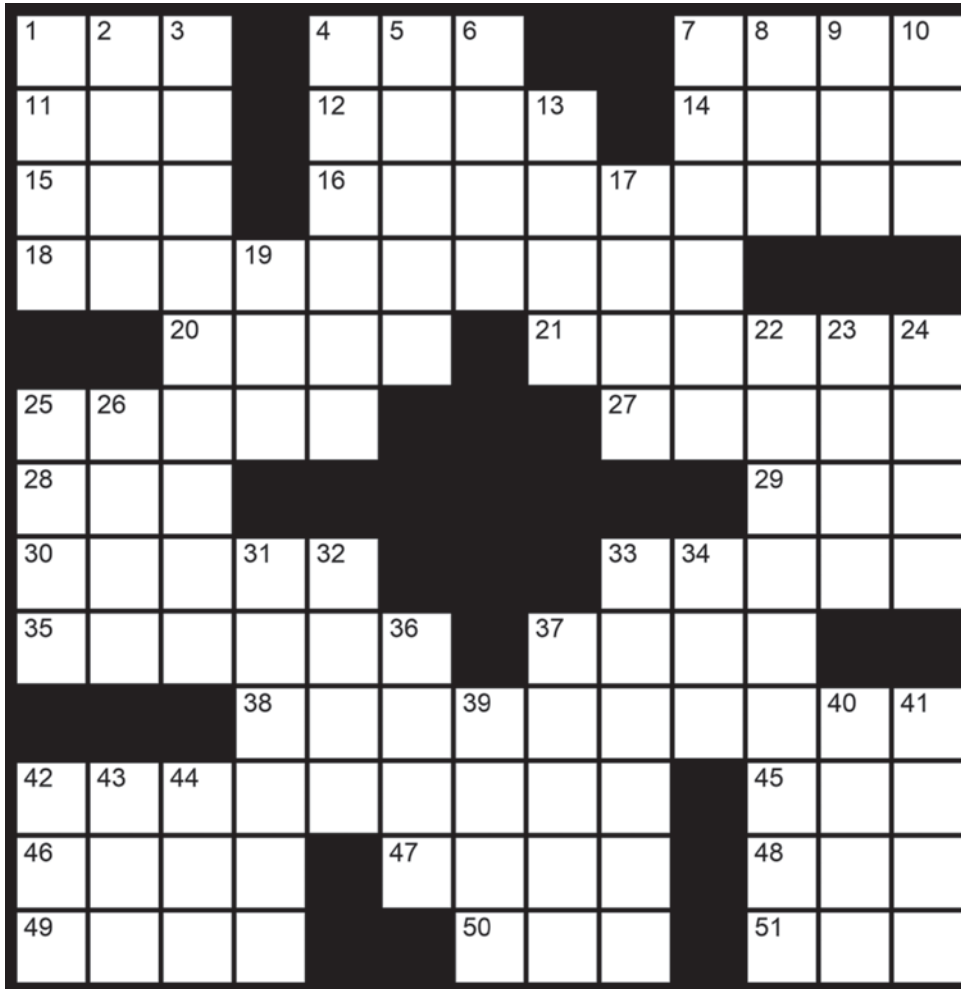

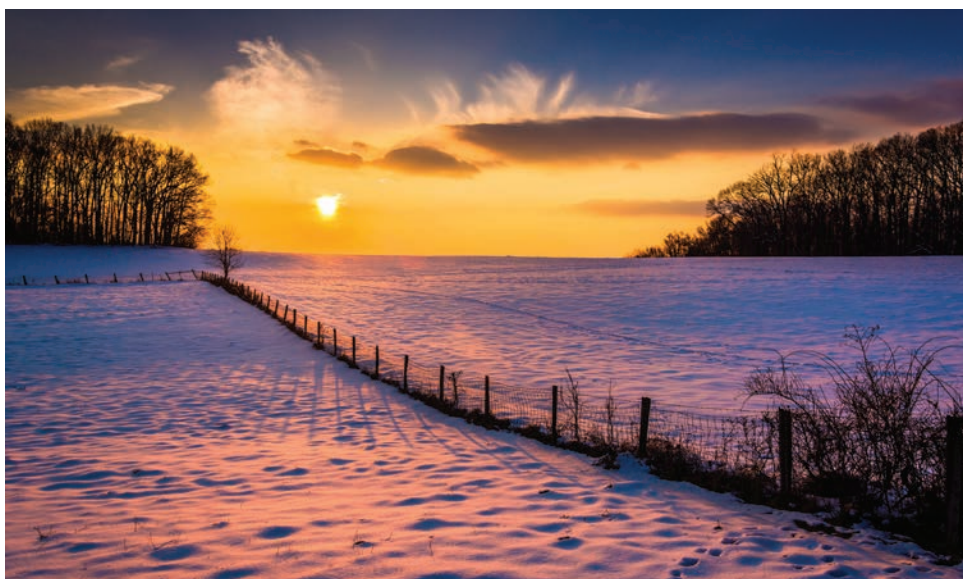
