Abney, Scribner running to represent Sedalia Second Ward on council

Three people are running for two seats on the La Monte R-IV School Board in the upcoming Missouri Elections slated for Tuesday, April 8

Michelle Abney and Lee Scribner are running for one open seat.

Each candidate was asked to fill out a questionnaire. Answers were limited to 150 words and candidates are listed alphabetically by last name. The candidates' responses have only been lightly edited for grammar.

Why are you running for office?

Abney: I never aspired to be a politician. But after seeing what everyone is going through with code enforcement, I knew I needed to get involved.

Scribner: I am running for city council because leadership means action, not words. It means listening to the people, standing up for what's right, and making decisions that serve all residents — not just a select few. A city works best when its leaders are engaged, responsive, and focused on results. People want to know that their concerns matter, that progress is being made, and that their leaders are working for them. That is the kind of leadership I will bring

to Sedalia — one that listens, takes action, and puts the needs of residents first. Government exists to serve the people — not itself. And when government drags its feet, the people pay the price. I have been knocking on doors, speaking with families, and hearing firsthand what matters most — safe streets, responsible development, stronger city services, and leaders who actually listen. Sedalia is a city worth fighting for. I don't believe in sitting back and waiting for things to get better. I believe it's stepping up, taking responsibility, and getting things done. That is why I am running.

How to identify financial fraud and protect yourself

BTC Bank seminar offers tips to thwart scammers

BTC Bank held a Fraud and Financial Abuse Seminar on Thursday, March 20, at its Sedalia branch office, 2450 West 16th Street.

BTC Bank Security Officer Quentin McConkey discussed how to identify fraud and financial abuse and how to protect yourself.

An audience of interested citizens, bank employees and police officers listened as McConkey warned of the devious thieves constantly targeting the elderly with scams.

"Elderly fraud is an act targeting older adults in which attempts are made to deceive with promises, goods, services of financial benefit that do not exist, were never intended to be provided or misrepresented," McConkey said. "This happens to tons of people under the age of 60, it just happens that people over the age of 60 statistically are the most vulnerable."

Some of the people attending shared stories of loved ones and acquaintances taken for thousands of dollars by phone-scammers they had never even met.

"The older generation trusts people," McConkey said. "While that's a great character trait of theirs, unfortunately it gets them into trouble."

According to McConkey, the most common types of fraud listed in FBI and BTC statistics fall into one

of four basic categories; tech support fraud, confidence/romance scams, lottery-sweepstakes-inheritance, and crypto currency.

"Tech support fraud, this is by far the biggest one we see, and statistically it increased 45% from 2022," McConkey said. "When you see these numbers reported to the FBI, they believe only one in 44 of the cases gets reported. So when you see \$1.3 billion losses in 2023, theoretically you could take that times 44, that's the type of money that we're talking here."

Let's say you get a text message that says you have a virus on your phone.

"That's how it starts," McConkey said. "These are professional people, they are very smart and they know exactly what they're doing."

There is usually a sense of urgency and scammers tell their victims to not tell anyone, leading many elderly to not even tell their

own children their money has been stolen

"Nothing, nothing, nothing, is so important that you can't share with a loved one; whether that's someone that you go to church with, someone at your bank," McConkey said. "Just slow down, think about it, the IRS, they're not going to come knocking on your door looking for this money."

Confidence and romance scams are difficult because many victims won't admit the George Clooney look-alike they've sent thousands to doesn't even exist.

"They're going to claim they're in the military, live in a different country for work to avoid meeting in person," McConkey said. "Hey, I need you to send me some money, we're in love, I'm going to come see you, we'll get married, but I need a bit of money."

Victims will often send additional money when more problems inevitably

arise.

McConkey recalled warning one customer about suspicious online friends she mentioned.

"I would say this has scam written all over it," McConkey told her. "She said, 'I've got a boyfriend from Florida, and somebody over in Europe,' and she sent them \$50,000 over the course of their relationship."

Social media can provide easy access for fraud and scammers are relentless once they get any information they can use against their targets.

Grandparents may get calls or messages from people claiming to be their grandchildren that have just been in an accident and need bail money.

"He was in this crash, so he may sound a little bit different," McConkey said. "Don't tell anybody about this, he doesn't want anybody to know about this, that's why he called you"

Sedalia Council receives update on TIF Districts, approves FY 2025 budget

The Monday, March 17 Sedalia City Council meeting started with a presentation on the West and Midtown TIF Districts.

TIF Districts are a targeted economic development tool in which municipalities divert future property tax increases from a designated area towards funding redevelopment or public improvement projects, aiming to stimulate private investment in blighted areas.

Mahin: To support informed decision-making

that prioritizes student learning and fosters positive outcomes for students, the district, and the broader community.

Perriguy: I'm up for re-election and to put it simply, I'm not ready to be done yet. One thing that COVID taught me is that your local government has the biggest impact on your day-to-day life. I live, work, and am raising my own family in this district and I want to see it excel.

To keep kids safe, teach them the limits of adult authority

Local police confirmed two separate child abduction attempts in Lincoln and Stover last week, and a parent in Sedalia reported another child abduction attempt on social media.

In the Stover case, police arrested a suspect, James Ferrell of Versailles, and charged him with enticement of a child, kidnapping, and possession of a controlled substance.

So many stranger abduction attempts in such a short time is a highly unusual occurrence, not just in this area of Missouri, but anywhere in the United States. True crime television and online rumors about trafficking might lead you to believe that strangers snatching children off the street is a serious problem in our country. But the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children reports that only 1% of all child abductions are committed by someone outside the child's family.

In fact, the FBI reports that fewer than 350 children are kidnapped by strangers per year. Most missing children are runaways, and most abducted children are taken by a non-custodial parent. This does not mean that runaways and children kidnapped by a parent are not in any danger. What it does mean is that what happened in our small communities last week is blessedly rare.

No child was kidnapped or harmed in any of the recent local abduction attempts. In fact, the kids were widely praised for knowing what to do in a dangerous situation and telling a trusted adult what was happening right away. Parents and the public have learned a lot since the high-profile child kidnappings of the 1980s and 90s. Adults are warier and on the lookout for danger. Children are more supervised and more informed. But the single most important factor that's contributed to making kids safer in the past four decades is a change in the way we teach kids to interact with authority.

Here are four important messages your child must know, and how they've changed over the years:

1. Authority has limits: Gone are the days when children are expected to obey their elders, period. And that's probably a good thing. Instead of "respect your elders" as a general rule, talk to your child about authority, its boundaries, and its appropriate uses. A teacher has authority over you, but not outside of school matters. A coach has authority over you, but not outside of sports. A random stranger has no authority over you at all. And above all, no one, not even a parent, has the authority to

make you do something you consider dangerous or immoral.

2. Saying no is not rude: Little kids, especially little girls, used to be given the message that saying no to someone else's request was offensive. "Just give Uncle So-and-So a hug, don't be rude!" is a classic example of a parent riding roughshod over a child's developing sense of good judgment. Instead of this paradigm, teach your kids that they have power over their own bodies and brains. Reassure them they're allowed to say no to physical touch, strange requests, or even a grownup asking for a favor. "No thank you," is not a rude response, and any safe adult will not be offended by a child's refusal to do something for them.

3. There are no "safe jobs:" In the past, we taught children to seek out people "in uniform" and presented teachers, nurses, policeman and clergy as professions that kids could trust. We now know that this is far from the case. Instead of sorting adults into safe and unsafe professions, teach kids that every adult has the choice to be a good person or a bad person. Most people are good, but there is no job a grownup can pick that will keep them from being a "bad guy" if they really want to.

4. I will believe you: This is the most important thing your child can hear from you. Tell her you trust her judgment and that she should trust her gut. Show her that you take her seriously. Above all, tell him you'll believe him if he tells you someone in his life is creepy – whether that someone is a man or a woman, a stranger, a scout leader, or even a family member. The children in last week's abduction attempts are all still safe with their families, in large part, because they had a relationship of trust. They knew they could go to their safe adults and be immediately believed about what happened to them. If you have a habit of dismissing your child's concerns, or come at them with a "What do you know, you're just a kid," attitude, you will not have the foundation of trust that prompts them to come to you when something suspicious happens.

Cost of living

When Max and I returned from our road trip, I read in the paper both an article about misinformation on social media regarding a house in Sedalia that had been torn down, and a letter to the editor criticizing the City's code enforcement department. I shook my head. Some things never change – and some people are never happy.

The subjects of the City's code enforcement and what to do about dilapidated houses in Sedalia have been controversial for, it seems, forever. One of the reasons I was removed from my job as municipal judge was the City Council's dissatisfaction about how I handled the owners of houses that didn't meet code, who had been cited for ordinance violations.

No matter how many times I talked to the Council about my limited choices and the fact that other cities have the same problems, I always got the feeling that they wanted me to either put people in jail for noncompliance or set impossible fines that people couldn't pay. After all, if someone couldn't pay to have a new roof put on, how in the world would they be able to pay hundreds of dollars in fines?

Balancing the rights of property owners, the requirement of due process, and the plain wording of the city ordinances is a delicate dance. Some people don't want to do the work to maintain a house. Some people are renters and don't feel as if they should be required to do the work. Some people are "absentee owners," meaning they own the house, rent it out, but live elsewhere – maybe another state. But the largest group of people in violation are elderly with little income and who own the house outright. They spend their meager \$700-\$800 Social Security check on food, utilities, and medicine, and as far as I was concerned, jail was not an option in those cases.

My choices were: 1) give people time to fix their houses; or 2) take a guilty plea and assess a fine for violation, which

didn't solve the original problem. No one was happy with those outcomes, especially the City Council. Twice in my 22 years, the City condemned houses and slated them for teardown. The owners had the right to, and did, appeal to the Circuit Court. The evidence, though, was overwhelming, and the houses were demolished. In both cases, the City helped the owners find new housing.

The debate rages on, though I thought I handled most cases appropriately, giving owners reasonable time, or trying to find organizations that would be able to help, though they are few and far between. I did my best. Obviously, that wasn't enough.

And speaking of meager \$700-\$800 Social Security checks, hold onto your hats. Presidents Trump and Musk are about ready to put the brakes on that "government giveaway." According to PBS, at the end of March, Social Security recipients will not be able to talk to representatives on the telephone unless they cannot access the department via computer/internet. And the government is going to close at least 40 field offices, meaning that some of those people

without a computer or computer knowledge will be unable to talk directly to a representative for assistance. This makes things difficult for the most vulnerable in our society.

Musk is supposed to be rooting out government waste and fraud, but the only evidence of any of that in Social Security is that \$72 billion was wrongfully distributed between 2015 and 2022. That's a lot of money, but it is less than 1% of the total distribution during that time. It seems to me that the best way to find that money is to have dedicated staff audit and go after it. Instead, the new administration has offered buyouts to 10,000 employees, expecting to cut 7,000, according to CBS.

This new move, instead of helping elderly folks such as those who can't fix their houses, children of deceased parents, and disabled people, hinders those who depend on the monthly check from the agency they – or their parents or spouses – have paid into all their working lives.

It's a scary time. But what do billionaires know about "scary"? Obviously, very little.

“The amended agreement was in 2019,” Simmons said. “Since the agreement was amended and started the District we’ve added; in 2023 Slim Chicken’s, 2020 Big O Tires, and in 2018 Aspen Dental and Scooters. There is remaining land to develop at the West 50, Main, and Oak Grove intersection ... The assessed valuation added to the redevelopment project is \$513,280. The anticipated assessed value of the District termination will be \$2,203,551.”

The Midtown TIF was an amended agreement from July 2018 that added the Lamy Building project to the original TIF District.

“Since the inception, we have completed the Trust Building project, the Broadway Arms demolition,” Simmons said. “The Ohio Streetscape is completed, but is an additional streetscape to identify going forward. The Liberty Center we are still reviewing submittals from them for payment. New businesses this year have included Los Volcanes, Marie Grace Boutique, Designer’s Touch Boutique, Kempf’s Country Market, Lost Cargoes Thrift Store, Redeemed Threads Consignment and Boutique.”

The assessed valuation added to the Midtown TIF District is \$4,274,190.

After final budget amendments for Fiscal Year 2025 passed unanimously,

the adoption of the budget was quickly summed-up by Interim City Administrator Matt Wirt.

The council unanimously voted to adopt the budget following the comments.

The council then quickly passed ordinances adopting a five-year capital improvement plan, a \$140,000 annual appropriation for Economic Development of Sedalia-Pettis County, and an annual appropriation of \$12,000 to the Scott Joplin International Ragtime Foundation’s 2025 Festival and a request from the Embassy for an additional \$100,000 from Opioid Settlement Funding.

In Public Works, a bid from Fahrner Asphalt Sealers \$266,949.50 for Sedalia Airport runway rehabilitation was accepted and the agreement passed unanimously.

A supplemental agreement with H.W. Lochner on the Airport Runway Rehabilitation Project for \$11,499.79 also passed as did a contract extension for generator maintenance at \$27,960.00 with Martin Energy Group.

A change order for a SCADA Upgrade at \$27,209.00 for the Central and North wastewater treatment plants passed as did a change order for \$22,180.66 in storm drainage improvements by S & A Equipment & Builders, LLC.

Joleigh Cornine gave an update on Sedalia Main Streets and said the First Thursday event downtown has grown each year and is now firmly established as a

Sedalia tradition.

“We will definitely see you downtown during First Thursdays,” Cornine said. “If you say there’s nothing to do in downtown please contact Sedalia Main Streets and we’ll make sure there’s something for you guys to enjoy the whole season.”

During the miscellaneous items portion, First Ward councilmen Jack Robinson and Tom Oldham noted they had recently been hearing complaints from concerned citizens about the intersection of East Third Street and South Park Avenue.

“We just have an increase of foot traffic there,” Oldham said. “What we don’t have is a four-way stop at that intersection. It’s also the only park that’s by a 30 mph zone, so we have several of our residents in our Ward that have come to us over the last couple of months that would love to see a four-way stop sign at that intersection.”

Staff was directed to draft an ordinance for adding a four-way stop at Park and Third for consideration at the next City Council meeting.

The Good and Welfare portion of the meeting gave citizens minutes to speak on the record.

“Water lines are breaking, infrastructure is falling apart, streets are terrible, absolutely horrible,” David Goodson said. “I think we’ve got a great group of people working at the City, and working on our roads but I think they’re understaffed. I think they don’t

have enough equipment.”

Goodson also complained about the \$800,000 in legal bills for Sedalia last year and suggested the money would have been better spent on the roads.

Nicole Joyner addressed Mayor Andrew Dawson about an issue involving emails, previous conversations and his lack of response to her phone calls.

“Today is the 48th day since I called your office and left a very detailed message in regards to emails that were leaked online between you and my husband,” Joyner said. “I would like for you to explain to me why you didn’t feel you needed to call me back or acknowledge it?”

Joyner referenced a previous conversation with Dawson regarding her traffic safety complaints near Heber Hunt Elementary and promises she said he made.

“You need to own up and fix what you said you would, because you’re a liar,” Joyner accused. “You’re a liar, you came to my home and you lied.”

City Council candidate Harry Hoffert took three minutes to express his indignation at guidelines for speaking to the council.

The list states the Mayor presides over and controls the meeting, grants speakers three minutes to speak, asks for comments to not be repeated from testimony to testimony, states a member of the public cannot speak more than once during public comment, states the purpose is for citizens to

provide input regarding an agenda item rather than engaging in dialog, asks all questions to be directed to the Mayor, states only people called to the podium can speak to the council during a meeting, states those addressing the council or yelling from the audience may be removed by the Mayor’s order and states the Mayor has the right to determine whether or not someone is out of order and subject to removal from the meeting.

“I hope you don’t think that we have to be allowed to come up here and talk,” Hoffert said. “No, that’s our right, we put you there. We’re the ones that put you there.”

Hoffert then seemed to accuse the council of duplicitous behavior.

“Some of you guys, this is not you all the time,” Hoffert said. “But when you come into this room you switch that hat.”

Citizen Debbie Covington praised Wirt’s efforts.

“Please know I’m not turning my back on you,” Covington said to Wirt. “I’m turning my back on all these people up here including Lauber Law Firm.”

Citizen Debbie Covington then accused council members and the Sedalia Democrat of spreading lies and misinformation through recent articles about homes recently demolished by city crews.

Fourth Ward Councilman Steve Bloess took three minutes to step down from the council’s platform to address the council and guests

from the podium.

“I want to make sure that everybody understands that there have been articles in the paper that are truthful, that are juried by a journalistic body,” Bloess said. “We try to get these articles in the paper, there was one [Tuesday, March 11] about the house at 15th and Prospect. There was another one [Tuesday, Feb. 25] that was true that Rhiannon Foster helped with and I told her I was proud of her for that.”

Before Monday’s City Council meeting, the City of Sedalia issued a release that stated it received a letter from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources regarding the composition of materials found in the demolition of several properties.

The notice confirmed demolitions at 1512 South Prospect Ave., 119 South Stewart, and 818 W. 5th St. have reached the necessary time frame for work to continue.

“City crews are actively developing a plan to remediate the affected properties and dispose of debris in accordance with state and federal guidelines, the release said. “Our teams are focused on ensuring the process is conducted safely and in full compliance with MO DNR and EPA requirements. We anticipate beginning this cleanup effort in the coming weeks, with a qualified, specially trained professional on-site to oversee the work as prescribed.”

Lottery, sweepstakes and inheritance scams can start in social media, email, text or calls where there is cash suddenly yours if you'll pay a small fee.

"To claim your prize money you must pay fees and taxes." McConkey said. "When you get that carrot dangled in front of you that says we're going to send you \$50,000, you've just got to send me this little bit of money and I'm going to get you this life-changing money." McConkey noted crypto currency fraud is up from \$55 million losses in 2020 to a whopping \$4 billion in losses in 2023.

"So you can see from right there that this is becoming the new wave." McConkey said. "And it makes it really hard to track where the money is going and once it's gone it's gone you're not getting that back."

McConkey stressed using these 10 tips to avoid being scammed:

- Talk with vulnerable friends and family.
• Read online reviews prior to

making purchases.

- Never give out personal information unless the sources are credible.
• Be aware of what you post on social media. Don't make yourself a vulnerable target.
• If it's too good to be true, it probably is.
• Legitimate businesses won't accept payment via gift cards.
• IRS and Social Security will not call and ask to confirm information.
• Install antivirus software.
• Contact your bank right away if you think they've sent money to a scammer.
• Report attempted and successful fraudulent activity to Reportfraud.ftc.gov.

I have coached our kids in basketball, served on the Smith-Cotton Booster Club, worked with Sedalia Helping Hands, and helped clean up our neighborhoods. I've worked on the Board of Appeals and Board of Adjustments, where I have listened to residents, property owners, and business leaders to make fair, common-sense decisions that help our city grow. Leadership isn't about fancy words or big speeches. It's about knowing the people you serve and standing up for what's right. That's what I've done, and that's what I'll

What would be your top priorities in office?

Abney: Transparency. The citizens need to know how the City of Sedalia is using their money. Overreach by Code Enforcement, by finding ways to help our citizens.

Scribner: A strong city government does not make promises it cannot keep. It listens, it works, and it gets things done. We must start with public safety. If people don't feel safe in their neighborhoods, nothing else matters. That means better policing, improved street lighting, and stronger traffic control. We must have smart development. Growth should benefit the people who live here — not just developers. That means responsible zoning, better infrastructure, and decisions made with residents in mind. We must improve city services. Roads need to be repaired. Sanitation must run efficiently. Emergency response must be fast and reliable. We must bring transparency and accountability to local government. The people of Sedalia deserve to know how decisions are made, where their tax dollars go, and what their leaders are doing. And we must take care of our first responders. Firefighters and police officers need the best

equipment, training, and support possible ... And we must stop waiting to fix the Washington Street bridge.

What goals do you have for office if you are elected?

Abney: Washington St. bridge, we must get that open for emergency vehicles. Live streaming all boards and commission meetings.

Scribner: I will push for better public safety — more support for police, improved lighting in our neighborhoods, and a fire station on the North Side to cut down on response times. I'll make sure development is responsible — that zoning and infrastructure decisions are made with the people in mind, not just big businesses. I will fight to improve city services. The roads, the sanitation, the emergency response — all of it needs to work better and serve residents more efficiently. I will make sure your government listens. That means transparency, open communication and city leaders who actually respond when people call. I will ensure that the Washington Street bridge is repaired or replaced as soon as possible. This city cannot afford to let critical infrastructure sit in disrepair while people suffer the consequences. I don't make empty promises. I say what I mean, and I do what I

Why should people vote for you?

Abney: I will be a listener first and foremost, by always prioritizing your voices and vision for our city. As your council member I will always put Sedalia first. I have no personal agenda or desire to run for higher office.

Scribner: I wasn't born into privilege. I wasn't handed success. I was raised by a single mother in Kansas City, the oldest of my siblings, helping raise my brothers and sisters. We didn't have much, but we had hard work, determination, and the belief that if you put in the effort, you could build a better life. I know what it means to struggle. I know what it means to start with nothing and fight for something. And that's why I'm running — to fight for the people of Sedalia. For 20 years I have lived in the Second Ward, raising my family, working my way up from industrial maintenance to plant manager, and giving back to this community. I've knocked on doors, stood in living rooms, and heard directly from the people what needs to change — safer streets, smarter growth and city services that actually work for the people.

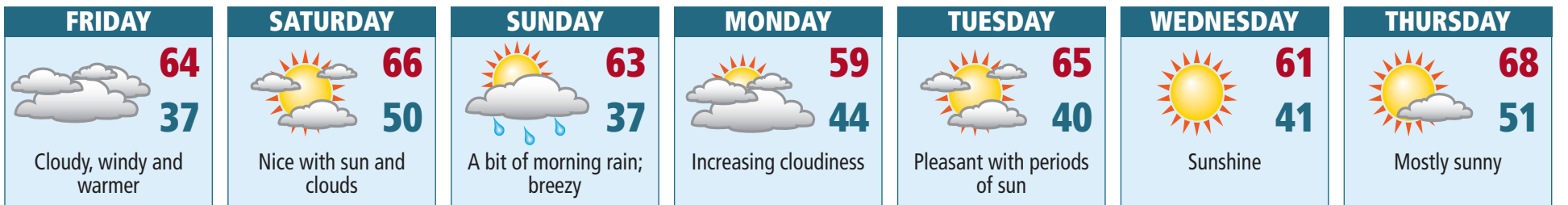

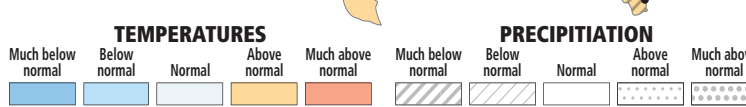
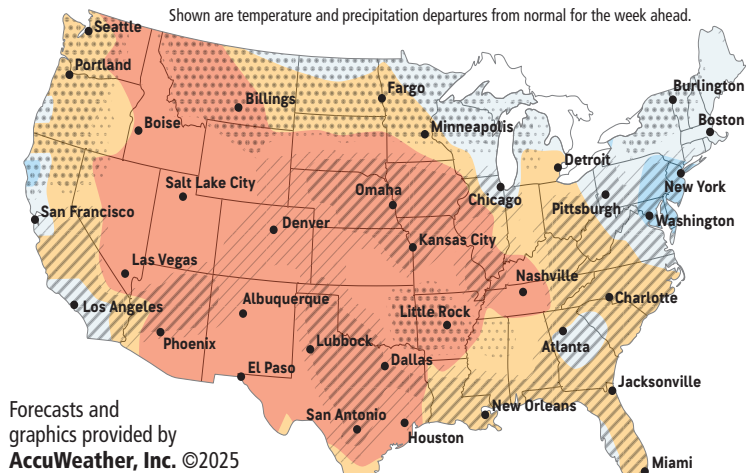
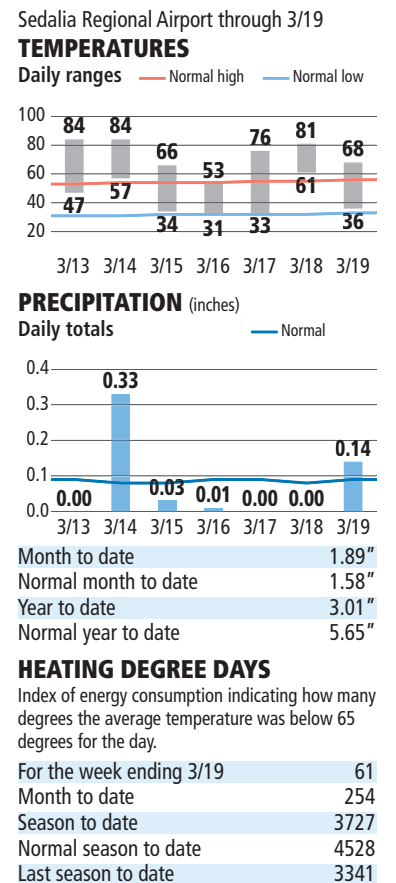

Northwest junior Gabby Meyer received her second career All-State nod from the Missouri Basketball Coaches Association on Wednesday, March 19.

Meyer was the Lady Mustangs' lone representative on the Class 1 team after she led Northwest to a 23-5 record, a Kaysinger Conference Tournament title and the Class 1 District 8 championship.

Meyer, who also has two All-State selections in her volleyball career, averaged 20.5 points and 8.5 rebounds this season.

Among her many highlights, Meyer scored 31 points in a 48-32 win against Bunceton with Otterville on Dec. 28.

Meyer also had 25 points in a game against Concordia on Dec. 2, which helped her notch her 1,000th career point.

Meyer's play also earned her the Class 1 District 8 Player of the Year title. Her teammate, junior Mary Walker, was also named to the All-District team.

Pinzke earns Class 3 All-State recognition

Stover senior Ashlyn Pinzke earned the first All-State selection of her basketball career Wednesday after she was named to the Class 3 team.

Pinzke led the Lady Bulldogs to a 23-3 record this season, earning them the Kaysinger Conference regular-season title. Twenty-three wins is the most Stover girls basketball has seen in modern MSHSAA record-keeping history, which goes back to 2009.

Over the course of her career, Pinzke has racked up 79 wins and 30 losses. In that span, the Lady Bulldogs have been district runners-up four times, including this year when they fell to Lone Jack in the Class 3 District 13 championship.

Pinzke finishes her career at Stover as the program's

No. 9 Creighton tops No. 8 Louisville in March Madness opener

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Jamiya Neal scored a career-high 29 points and had 12 rebounds, Steven Ashworth connected from well beyond the arc on the way to 22 points, and ninth-seeded Creighton beat No. 8 seed Louisville 89-75 on Thursday in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

Coach Greg McDermott's Bluejays (25-10) won their fifth consecutive March Madness opener and beat a team ranked in the top 10 for the second time this season. Louisville (27-8), despite its unimpressive seeding, entered at No. 10 in the AP Top 25.

Seeking its fourth Sweet 16 appearance in five years, Creighton will play either No. 1 overall seed Auburn or 16th-seeded Alabama State in the second round of the South Region on Saturday.

Chucky Hepburn scored 22 points and Terrence Edwards Jr. had 21 for Louisville (27-8), which improved its record by 19 wins over last season with a transfer-heavy roster under first-year coach Pat Kelsey. It was the Cardinals' first March Madness appearance since 2019.

After a cold start by the Bluejays, Ashworth and Jackson McAndrew (11 points) got hot from the perimeter, with each making two 3-pointers in a 12-0 run.

Ashworth's 3 near the March Madness logo made it 31-25. McAndrew connected from deep after an offensive rebound, Ashworth converted again, and then McAndrew drained a transition 3 to make it 40-25. Creighton ultimately surged to a 20-point lead late in the first half and cruised from there.

Ashburn finished 4 of 8 from long range as Creighton made 11 of 24 from 3 and 32 of 56 overall (58%).

Neal scored 17 points after halftime to top his previous best of 24 against UConn on Jan. 18. Fifth-year senior Ryan Kalkbrenner added 14 points as he seeks to return to the Sweet 16 for the fourth time of a career that began in 2020-21.

Banning tush push, changes to playoff seeding among proposed NFL rule changes

The Green Bay Packers have formally proposed a rule change to ban the tush push and the Detroit Lions proposed that playoff seeding be done based on record instead of automatically placing division winners in the top four spots.

Teams made several other proposals released Wednesday that will be added to additional ones made by the competition committee to be considered at the league meetings later this month, including a change to the overtime rule and the so-called legal tampering period in free agency.

Any rule change must be approved by 24 out of 32 team owners.

Packers general manager Brian Gutekunst said last month at the scouting combine that his team wanted to ban the tush push, which is a modified quarterback sneak where two or three teammates line up behind the quarterback and push him forward to help him try to gain the yardage necessary for a first down or touchdown.

Philadelphia has used the play successfully behind Jalen Hurts for the past three seasons in short-yardage situations, including during a 40-22 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs in Super Bowl 59. Other teams have tried to use it as well but without the success of the Eagles.

The proposed rule states that no offensive player may "immediately at the snap, push or throw his body against a teammate, who was lined up directly behind the snapper and received the snap, to aid him in an attempt to gain yardage." Doing so would result in a 10-yard penalty.

The playoff change proposal by the Lions would have led to significant changes last season when Minnesota had to go on the road for a wild-card game against the Rams despite winning four more games than Los Angeles in the regular season. The Vikings would have hosted a game as the third seed under the proposal.

The Chargers also went on the road as a wild-card team against division-winning Houston despite having one additional win.

Under the proposed rule, the first tiebreaker among tied teams would be based on winning the division.

The Eagles proposed a change in overtime rules to align it more like the playoffs when each team is guaranteed an opportunity to score. The proposal would extend regular-season overtime from 10 minutes to 15 and the game wouldn't end if the team that got the ball first scored a touchdown.

League executive Troy Vincent said last month that changes were needed to overtime rules to decrease the advantage of winning the coin toss. Receiving the ball first has become more of an advantage than before 2011, when overtime was sudden death. Receiving teams won 56.8% of overtime games from 2017-24, up from 55.4% from 2001-11.

In other proposed changes:

—The Lions proposed that illegal contact and defensive holding penalties would not give the offense an automatic first down.

—The Steelers proposed that teams would be allowed to have one video call or phone call

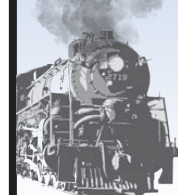
with prospective unrestricted free agents from other teams and their agents during the two-day negotiating window before the start of the league year. Currently teams are allowed to talk only to agents during this period. It also would allow for teams to arrange travel for prospective free agents as long as the travel didn't start until after the league year.

—The Lions proposed that players put on injured reserve before or on the day that rosters are cut to 53 shouldn't count on the 90-man roster limit, unless they will be designated to return during the season.

—Several clubs proposed allowing teams to prepare the special kicking balls before the day of the game like they can with regular balls.

—Washington proposed allowing teams to obtain scouting credentials for games in Weeks 17 and 18 for potential playoff opponents in the conference and requiring teams hosting wild-card games to grant scouting credentials to any team in their conference that is in the playoffs.

Notre Dame women look to dynamic backcourt to regain momentum for March Madness

SOUTH BEND, Ind. — Early in the season, Notre Dame built a sparkling resume with victories against two eventual No. 1 seeds — USC and Texas — and a pair of No. 2 seeds in UConn and Duke.

The end of the season was a different story.

After losing three of their last five games, the Fighting Irish enter the NCAA Tournament with a No. 3 seed. Notre Dame (26-5) takes on No. 14 seed Stephen F. Austin (29-5) in the first round in South Bend on Friday.

If Notre Dame is to regain its magic and make a run to the Final Four, it will start with a dynamic backcourt regarded as one of the best in the nation: Hannah Hidalgo and Olivia Miles, the pair who combined for 45 points in a 79-68 victory against UConn on Dec. 12.

That display by the Fighting Irish background impressed UConn coach Geno Auriemma.

“I don’t know if there’s a better combination of guards than those two with how many different things they can hurt you with,” Auriemma said after the game. “Those guys are attacking you for the entire 40 minutes. And I don’t know that I’ve seen anybody up close yet that can do that.”

Hidalgo, a 5-foot-6 sophomore, leads Notre Dame in points (24.2) and steals (3.7), fourth in the nation in each category. She deals out 3.7 assists a game.

Miles, a 5-10 graduate student, leads the nation with three triple-doubles. She averages 16.2 points, 5.9 rebounds and 5.8 assists a game. She leads the ACC in assists (14th nationally). The two New Jersey natives each average nearly 41% in 3-point shooting.

Teams powered by dominant bigs — not guards — have ruled the national championship scene the past two decades.

Since 2005, only two guards smaller than 6-feet have earned most outstanding player in the national championship game: Chloe Jackson of Baylor in 2019 and Arika Ogunbowale of Notre Dame in 2018. Stanford’s 6-foot-1 guard Haley Jones is the only other guard to be named MOP, earning the honor in 2021.

Notre Dame is a rare exception to the rule. The Fighting Irish were guard-driven in their run to the championship in 2018.

“Fortunately I’ve seen that with our 2018 team,” coach Niele Ivey said of coming up with a blueprint for a guard-drive title run. “You know, we had a rock star backcourt (in 2018), Arike Ogunbowale, Marina Mabrey, Jackie Young.”

Hidalgo said the New Jersey swagger she and Miles share will fuel a Notre Dame team stung by its recent skid and No. 3 seeding.

“I think it could definitely be a ‘Jersey’ thing,” Hidalgo said of the fierce

competitiveness that she and Miles share. “We play with ... just this grit, and we play with this chip on our shoulders. And you know, that’s important. I know for me, coming from Jersey, playing with boys, I know it definitely gave me

that chip on my shoulder. But I think (our toughness) is different. Jersey girls are just different.”

Ivey said that Hidalgo and Miles forged a special bond in the summer after Miles returned from a season off with a knee injury.

No. 3 Central Missouri baseball falls to Northwest Missouri State

The Mules (17-5, 8-2 MIAA) went up 1-0 in the top of the third through a RBI groundout from sophomore Austin Buie. redshirt senior Dayvin Johnson made it 2-0 in the top of the fourth through a

home run.

Bearcats (10-12, 4-6 MIAA) graduate student Brady Miles recorded a two-RBIs homer in the bottom of the fourth to tie it. The Mules went back ahead as senior Ayden Blachowicz advanced home on a steal.

Flagg ready to go for No. 1 Duke

RALEIGH, N.C. — Duke freshman star Cooper Flagg says he's good to go after spraining his left ankle last week, just in time for March Madness.

The top-seeded Blue Devils said Flagg will be active for Friday's first-round game against Mount St. Mary's in the NCAA Tournament's East Region. Meanwhile, the unanimous Associated Press first-team All-American said Thursday that he's pain-free and was able to return to full practice a day earlier.

"I feel very good," he said. "I'm very confident moving forward."

Flagg was hurt in the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament quarterfinals and missed the Blue Devils' wins in the semifinals and title game. He said he "hated every second" of not being able to play after the injury, but X-rays and an MRI both came back with results that indicated he could return after a short absence.

"I've rolled my ankle a good amount

of times growing up playing basketball," the 18-year-old Flagg said. "Usually I'm able to just tie my shoe and walk it off. It was definitely a little bit of a different feeling as soon as I rolled my ankle this time, I knew it was a little bit more severe and a little more serious."

Flagg jogged and glided through Thursday's public practice in the arena about a half-hour's drive from the Duke campus. He showed no indications of being hobbled, including when he knocked down five straight 3-pointers — twice on the right wing, left corner, left wing and back to the right — during a shootaround.

Coach Jon Scheyer said he wouldn't let Flagg play if he had been "compensating" for the injury in the practice, but added Flagg still "has to work through" a bit more to be 100 percent.

"We built him up slowly and really progressed him the right way, but he's ready to go," Scheyer said. "In his mind, he was ready last weekend, but he wasn't."

Missouri hires Kellie Harper as new women's basketball coach

Kellie Harper has been hired as the new women's basketball coach at Missouri, where the former coach of SEC rival Tennessee will have the job of rebuilding a once-proud program that has not been to the NCAA Tournament in six years.

Missouri athletic director Laird Veatch announced Harper's hiring Tuesday.

Harper grew up in Sparta, Tennessee, and played under Pat Summitt with the Volunteers, helping them win three consecutive national championships. She began her coaching career in the SEC as an assistant at Auburn in 2000, and was the head coach for Western Carolina, NC State and Missouri State before replacing Holly Warlick at her alma mater in 2019.

Harper led the Lady Vols to the NCAA Tournament in each of the four seasons it was held, including back-to-back Sweet 16 trips in 2022 and '23. She was fired after last season, when Tennessee went 20-13 and made the second round of the NAAs.

"Missouri is a special place, and I know firsthand the passion and pride that surrounds this program,"

Harper said. "Our family is excited to return to the state of Missouri. I look forward to working with our leadership and our student-athletes, building strong relationships throughout the community and winning championships in Columbia."

Harper replaces Robin Pingeton, who stepped down after 13 seasons leading the Tigers.

"Kellie is a proven winner and dynamic leader," Veatch said. "She is nationally respected, and her experience in the SEC, her deep ties to the state of Missouri and her ability to recruit and develop championship-level players make her the ideal leader for our program. We are incredibly excited about the future of Mizzou women's basketball under her leadership."

Harper, the fifth women's basketball coach in school history, has spent 20 years as a Division I head coach. Her teams are a combined 393-260 with nine NCAA Tournament appearances and four conference tournament titles.

Missouri is planning an introductory news conference for Mizzou Arena. The date had not been announced.

"The foundation is in place for success," Harper said, "and I can't wait to get started."

Schlotzhauer helped the Lady Cardinals beat Norwood in the Class 2 third-place game on March 15 by scoring 20 points and pulling down nine rebounds in the contest.

Schlotzhauer also earned the Class 2 District 8 Player of the Year

title.

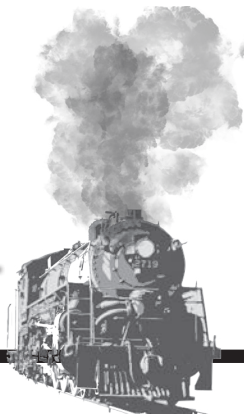

The vast expanse of space has always intrigued me. As a child, I thought about how amazing it would be to be an astronaut and travel through space to visit other planets.

My favorite planet was Pluto, but I'm not sure why. Maybe I just liked its name. I hated to see it retired to the designation of a large rock floating around in an airless expanse. I fondly remember watching the old black-and-white version of "Star Trek" with my dad and dreaming of going where "no man has gone before." I still enjoy the newer "Star Trek" movies and, of course, the "Star Wars" films. In my heart, I know we aren't the only civilization in the vast expanse of space. As "The X-Files" poster on Agent Mulder's office wall says, "I want to Believe," I do too — give me some space, with some aliens to boot.

As I grew, I realized that reaching for those lofty stars and galaxies wouldn't be a career I was suited for. I wasn't good with math, physics, or chemistry and found I was more of a wordsmith and artist at heart. I did teach myself how to take photos of the moon and night sky, filled with the Milky Way and more stars than we can conceive. That gave me solace.

I was fascinated by the thought of American school teacher and astronaut Christa McAuliffe, who was going to go up in the Space Shuttle in 1986. I was devastated when I listened to the news reports that the shuttle blew up minutes after take-off. She was supposed to be the first civilian to travel to space. Her bravery inspired us all, especially women.

As talks of people traveling to Mars in the near future start to become a reality, I was excited this week to hear four NASA SpaceX Crew 9 astronauts made it safely back to Earth on Tuesday, March 18, when they splashed down in the Gulf of Mexico (Gulf of America) south of Tallahassee, Florida. Two of them, Sunita Williams and Butch Wilmore, had been staying at the International Space Station for nine months.

Williams and Wilmore had only planned to stay 12 days when things went awry with the Boeing Starliner spacecraft's thrusters. It's a long story swirled with controversy. But they were able to return on Tuesday with NASA astronaut Nick Hague and Russian Cosmonaut Aleksandr Gorbunov. I'm sure their adventure will become part of American space exploration history, and interestingly enough, as they splashed down, news sources stated that the Dragon Capsule "Freedom" was greeted by a pod of dolphins.

According to Space.com, Williams and Wilmore were the first astronauts to fly on two commercial spacecraft during a single mission. "Starliner's Crew Flight Test and Dragon's Crew-9 marked Williams' and Wilmore's third flight to and from space," Space.com said. "On this mission, the two astronauts traveled 121,347,491 statute miles (195,289,857 kilometers) while completing 4,576 trips around Earth in 286 days."

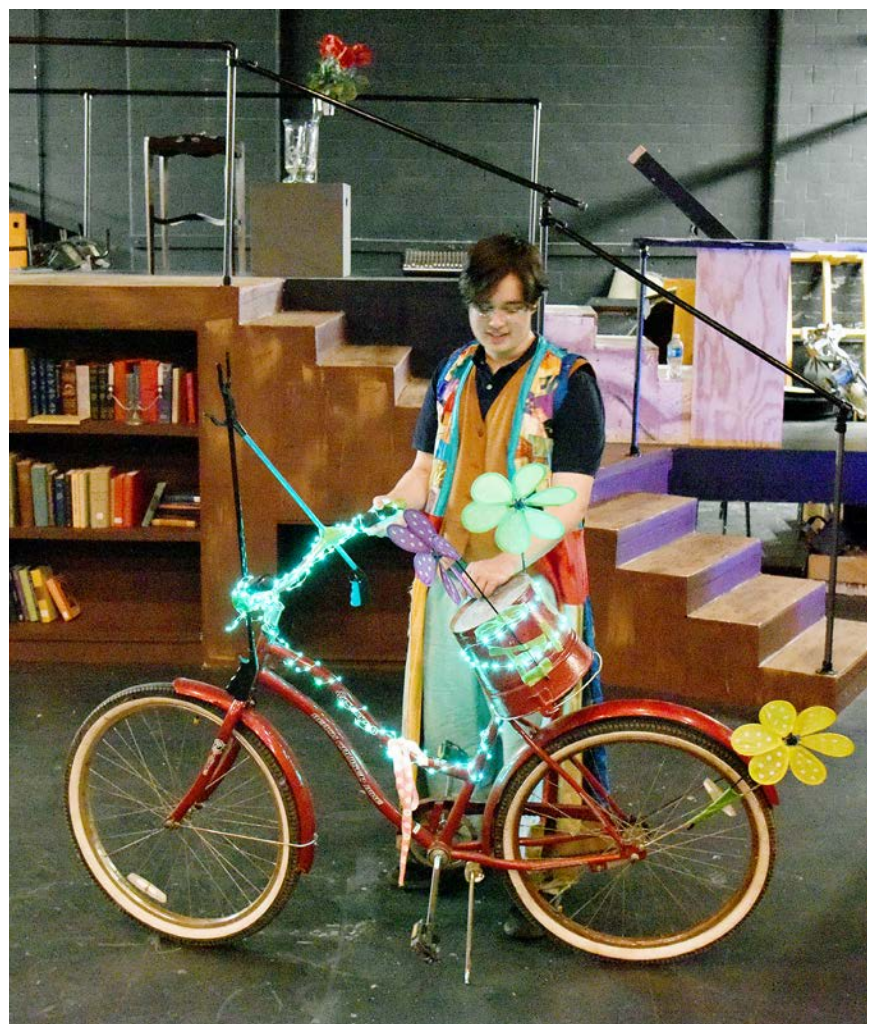
Turner added that with SHS and the Liberty Center, everyone works together to "make difficult, if not impossible, things happen."

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

Nurturing good fruit in the community

Luke 13:6-9 Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, "See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?" He replied, "Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next

year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down."

Jesus told many parables to those who followed him. A parable is a short, simple story used to illustrate a deeper truth. Jesus used parables to teach his followers moral and spiritual lessons. There can be many ways to see a parable and the parables of Jesus speak to us differently in the various times of our lives.

The parable of the Barren Fig Tree is speaking to me about community and relationships.

In that story, the owner of a vineyard had become disgusted with a fig tree that, after three years, was not giving any fruit. Anyone who has planted a fruit tree knows that it takes several years before the tree yields much of anything at all. Most fig trees take three to five years to produce fruit that will mature to the point of harvest. Nurturing fruit trees takes time.

Our relationships are like that. It takes time and care for us to nurture our individual relationships and to build up the relationships we share as a community.

Deciding to cut down or cut off relationships with other people, whether individually or in groups, is a serious thing. Of course, relationships do not always work and some are even toxic, but those are not the kind of relationships I am talking about in this article.

We were made to be in community with others, even so, being in relationship with other people can be hard. We think differently. We live differently. We believe differently. We worship differently. And yet, we are called into relationship with

God, through the love of Jesus Christ, and with the power of the Holy Spirit.

When asked about the commandments, Jesus said that the most important things are to love God with all we've got and to love our neighbors as ourselves. That kind of love takes effort and that is the kind of love that makes communities work.

So, what about that fig tree? That gardener saw the potential in the little tree and asked for some time. He nurtured the tree and fed it. He gave the fig tree a chance. Our world

needs more of that. God is calling us to take a little time, give a little care, feed and nurture our relationships with one another and with our community, wherever we may be. With the love of God in Christ we can feed our relationships and strengthen our communities. The harvest of love will be worth the effort. The harvest of love will change the world.

Catholic Charities refugee resettlement program in mid-Missouri to close after 14 years

The Central and Northern Missouri chapter of Catholic Charities will end its refugee resettlement program March 31.

In an email to supporters, Executive Director Litz Main said the nonprofit had to end the program due to the lack of federal funding.

"We deeply appreciate your partnership and

shared commitment to serving those in need," Main said in the email. "As we navigate this transition, we welcome opportunities to collaborate in new ways to continue supporting refugee families in our region."

The cuts come from a federal level, after President Donald Trump suspended the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program and halted all funding for agencies that support refugees. Although

the executive order was blocked by a federal judge in February, local resettlement programs still face a lack of federal funds.

There is no indication when the program will resume, and the case is expected to face an appeal from the Trump administration.

Catholic Charities has provided food assistance, disaster relief and family services for refugees for 14 years through the

program. The program stopped accepting new refugees earlier this year because of uncertainty about the future, according to an emailed statement.

The organization has worked with partner agencies to have those groups take over providing support to refugees. That transition will be complete by March 31, according to the statement.

"We are proud to have

welcomed and walked alongside so many who now call Missouri home, and we remain steadfast in our commitment to supporting these families through our partner agencies," Main said in the statement Wednesday. She was not available for additional questions.

Catholic Charities said in the statement it will continue to focus on its mission to support those in need in the Diocese of Jefferson City.

City of Refuge, a refugee-focused nonprofit in Columbia, said in an email to its supporters Tuesday that one of the largest federal grants it receives will no longer be given to nonprofits. The funding will end Sept. 30. City of Refuge was not available for comment.

Pope pens letter to the editor while in hospital

ROME — Pope Francis said in a letter published Tuesday that his lengthy illness has helped make "more lucid" to him the absurdity of war, as his top deputy rejected any suggestion of resignation and Buckingham Palace announced plans for an upcoming audience with Britain's King Charles III.

Italian daily Corriere della Sera published a letter to the editor from Francis, signed and dated March 14 from Rome's Gemelli hospital where the 88-year-old pontiff has been treated since Feb. 14 for a complex lung infection and double pneumonia.

In it, Francis renewed his call for diplomacy and international organizations to find a "new vitality and credibility." And he said that his own illness had also helped make

some things clearer to him, including the "absurdity of war."

"Human fragility has the power to make us more lucid about what endures and what passes, what brings life and what kills," he wrote.

Responding to a letter from the newspaper's editor-in-chief, Luciano Fontana, Francis also urged him and all those in the media to "feel the full importance of words."

"They are never just words: they are facts that shape human environments. They can connect or divide, serve the truth or use it for other ends," he wrote. "We must disarm words, to disarm minds and disarm the Earth."

The letter was published as Francis registered slight improvements in his treatment and as the Vatican No. 2, Cardinal Pietro Parolin, shot down any suggestion the pope might resign.

"Absolutely no," Parolin told journalists on Monday when asked if he and the pope had discussed a resignation. Parolin has visited Francis twice during his hospitalization, most recently on March 2, and said he found Francis better than during his first Feb. 25 visit.

Also on Tuesday, Francis received a standing ovation from the Italian Senate, after Premier Giorgia Meloni sent her greetings and said "not just this chamber, but all of the Italian people" wish the pope a full recovery "as soon as possible."

Meloni, who was the first outsider to visit the pope after he was hospitalized, said that "even in a trying moment, his strength and guidance have been felt."

Francis for the second day spent some time off high flows of oxygen and used just ordinary supplemental oxygen deliv-

ered by a nasal tube, the Holy See press office said Tuesday. In addition, for the first time in several weeks he didn't use the noninvasive mechanical ventilation mask at night at all, to force his lungs to work more.

While those amount to "slight improvements," the Vatican isn't yet providing any timetable on when he might be released. That said, Buckingham Palace announced Monday that King Charles III was scheduled to meet with Francis on April 8 at the Vatican, assuming he is back and well enough.

Such state visits are always closely organized with Parolin's office. However, the Vatican press office on Tuesday declined to confirm the visit, noting that the Holy See only confirms papal audiences shortly before they happen.

The developments came as the Vatican released

some details on the first photograph of Francis released since his hospitalization. The image, taken Sunday from behind, showed Francis sitting in his wheelchair in his private chapel in prayer without any sign of nasal tubes.

The photo, showing Francis wearing a Lenten purple stole, followed an audio message the pope recorded March 6 in which he thanked people for their prayers, his voice soft and labored.

Together, they suggested Francis is very much controlling how the public follows his illness to prevent it from turning into a spectacle. While many in the Vatican have held up St. John Paul II's long and public battle with Parkinson's disease and other ailments as a humble sign of his willingness to show his frailties, others criticized it as excessive and glorifying sickness.

The image certainly reassured some well-wishers who came to Gemelli to pray for Francis, who is recovering in the 10th-floor papal suite reserved for popes.

"After a month of hospitalization, finally a photo that can assure us that his health conditions are better," said the Rev. Enrico Antonio, a priest from Pescara.

But Benedetta Flagiello of Naples, who was visiting her sister at Gemelli, wondered if the photo was even real.

"Because if the pope can sit for a moment without a mask, without anything, why didn't he look out the window on the 10th floor to be seen by everyone?" she asked. "If you remember our old pope (John Paul II), he couldn't speak up, but he showed up."

But it is a story of redemption and learning your wrongs. Of changing your behavior and becoming a new and better person.”

She added Belle also learns to see beyond appearances.

“It is the ‘Tale as Old as Time,’” Turner said. “That’s why we tell stories; they make us feel things. That’s Aristotle, he said, ‘If it’s good theatre, you should feel catharsis or cleansed at the end.’ If it makes you cry, it’s probably a good thing.”

Early control needed for poison hemlock

Poison hemlock, a plant that can kill livestock, is one of the first weeds to appear in Missouri pastures, says Kevin Bradley, University of Missouri Extension weed scientist.

It also can cause birth defects in the offspring of pregnant livestock, especially when eaten in its earlier growth stage by animals in their first trimester of pregnancy, says MU Extension veterinary toxicologist Tim Evans.

Poison hemlock grows in ditches, roadways, fence-rows, shaded areas of pastures and in no-till cropping systems. During its first year, it forms an upright flower stalk. It bolts in its second year. It can grow to 10 feet tall.

It is commonly confused with the wild carrot. Its white flowers form in umbrella-shaped clusters like those of Queen Anne’s lace. Both have hollow stems, but poison hemlock’s purple-mottled stem is hairless. Queen Anne’s lace also rarely grows taller than 2 feet and poses no danger to humans or livestock.

Control poison hemlock with pasture herbicides early while it is in the rosette stage and before the plant forms flowers, says Bradley. Early control is important because mature plants with flowers do not respond as well to chemical control.

Nonchemical control options include hand weeding, mowing and tillage, Bradley says. In pastures, growth regulator herbicides and products with 2,4-D, dicamba or 2,4-D plus triclopyr are options.

Bradley says research has also shown that dicamba plus glyphosate may offer more consistent control than 2,4-D plus glyphosate, but glyphosate can only be used in a spot-spray scenario or where injury to desirable forages can be tolerated.

Every part of this biennial contains gamma-coniceine, coniine and other toxic compounds that are harmful even in very small amounts, says Evans. These toxins affect cattle most, particularly with respect to birth defects, but they also affect sheep, goats, swine, horses and other domestic animals.

Evans says these toxins affect the nervous system like nicotine, initially causing tremors that may progress to total paralysis and suffocation. Symptoms usually appear within an hour of ingestion, and the animal can die in a few hours.

In ancient Greece, poison hemlock was used to execute condemned prisoners, including the philosopher Socrates. Its potent toxins also can irritate the skin, so wear protective gear including gloves, long sleeves, pants and eye protection when working in areas with this plant.

Cows that eat poison hemlock during the first trimester of pregnancy may give birth to calves with skeletal deformities, a condition known as crooked calf syndrome, says Evans. The offspring of pigs, sheep and goat can exhibit similar signs.

The leaves of immature poison hemlock plants appear to be most palatable to livestock. Animals usually avoid eating mature plants, but this is not the case when poison hemlock is accidentally incorporated into hay, says Evans.

UCM professor’s research in journal highlights critical decline in butterflies, impact on food chain

A groundbreaking study published in the prestigious scientific journal *Science*, co-authored by University of Central Missouri’s Dr. Daniel Marschalek and more than 30 other researchers, reveals a troubling 22% decline in butterfly populations across the United States since 2000. This extensive study, one of the largest ever conducted on butterfly communities, raises serious concerns about ecosystems, food security and broader environmental health.

“Butterflies are an indicator of habitat health, and they’re declining, and it should really be a wake-up call,” said Dr. Marschalek, an associate professor in entomology and ecology at UCM. “When we think about butterflies or insects in general, they play essential roles as pollinators and as crucial food sources. About 80% of our plants require insect pollination, including butterflies. Without these insects, we’d lose many of the plants that animals depend on for food—leaves, berries, fruits—

and butterfly caterpillars are particularly important as food sources for birds.”

He added, “That includes small sparrows, which most people might not notice, but also larger birds like turkey or Bobwhite. If you’re a hunter, ensuring that young birds have a protein-rich meal from caterpillars helps sustain healthy populations. It’s hard to overlook the immense importance insects have within our ecosystems.”

“Since arriving on campus Dr. Marschalek has been a strong supporter of both undergraduate and graduate research by involving students in all aspects of his research,” said Scott Lankford, Ph.D., Chair, Department of Biological and Clinical Sciences at UCM. “We are thrilled that his hard work and dedication to pollinator conservation has received the recognition of being published in *Science*. This is a career defining publication that places Dan on a short list of experts in his field.”

The *Science* article analyzes data from 35

research and community science programs across the continental U.S. One of these programs has been run by Marschalek with contributions from UCM undergraduate and graduate students who helped collect portions of the data. Based on more than 76,000 surveys spanning two decades, the research found widespread butterfly declines in nearly every region. Two-thirds of the studied species showed population decreases of more than 10%, with the steepest declines recorded in the Southwest, where over 74 species have lost more than half their populations.

“There are preserves already designed to conserve wildlife, but they’re still declining in those areas,” Marschalek noted. “So you can imagine what’s happening outside of those preserves in other areas.”

Butterflies also appear to be shifting habitats northward, likely driven by climatic shifts. This movement may be challenging due to human-al-

tered landscapes, limiting available habitats crucial for survival.

“Maybe we’re getting towards the tail end where we’re certainly going to start losing some species, but certainly it’s not too late to help save many of them,” Marschalek said.

To address these declines, the research recommends habitat restoration, species-specific interventions, and reducing pesticide use as crucial strategies. Residents can actively contribute to butterfly conservation through simple yet impactful actions, such as planting native vegetation in their yards.

“We have black-eyed Susans, several milkweed species, wild bergamot, also called bee balm. Those are easy plants to grow,” Marschalek said “They typically require no watering, so if it’s really dry and you go on vacation, you don’t have to worry about them.”

USDA to begin disbursing economic aid to farmers amid low commodity prices

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced it will begin accepting applications from farmers affected by low commodity prices for economic aid beginning Wednesday, March 19.

The program, part of a \$10 billion relief package approved by Congress last December, aims to provide financial assistance to struggling agricultural producers facing declining market conditions.

“With clear direction from Congress, USDA has prioritized streamlining the process and accelerating these payments ahead of schedule, ensuring farmers have the resources necessary to manage rising expenses and secure financing for next season,” USDA Secretary Brooke Rollins said.

The initiative, known as the Emergency Commodity Assistance Program, will issue direct payments to farmers who cultivate eligible crops such as wheat, corn, barley, and oats.

Payment amounts will be determined based on acreage and production levels, offering much-needed relief as commodity prices contin-

ue to slump. Farmers who qualify for aid are expected to receive funds directly in their bank accounts within three business days of approval, according to USDA officials. According to a press release from USDA.gov, corn, wheat, and soybeans are eligible for up to \$42.91, \$30.69, and \$29.76 per acre, respectively.

The economic challenges facing American farmers have been exacerbated by global supply chain disruptions, fluctuating demand, and extreme weather conditions. Many agricultural producers have reported declining profit margins, leading to financial strain that threatens the long-term viability of their operations. The assistance program is designed to help alleviate some of these financial burdens, particularly for small- and medium-sized farms that are most vulnerable to price volatility.

Government officials and agricultural economists have pointed to several factors contributing to the recent downturn in commodity prices. A combination of increased global production, reduced export demand, and shifting consumer preferences has placed downward pressure on prices. Additionally,

trade uncertainties and the ongoing recovery from previous economic disruptions have further complicated market conditions.

While some farmers have managed to offset losses through diversification and cost-cutting measures, many remain in need of direct assistance to sustain their businesses. The USDA program is expected to play a critical role in helping agricultural producers cover input costs such as seeds, fertilizers, and equipment maintenance.

The aid initiative comes at a time when policymakers are closely monitoring the broader implications of declining farm income on rural economies. In many farming communities, economic downturns in agriculture have ripple effects, impacting local businesses, employment levels, and overall economic stability. Lawmakers have expressed concerns that prolonged financial struggles in the agricultural sector could lead to further consolidation of farms and a loss of family-owned operations.

To streamline the application process, the USDA has established an online portal where farmers can submit required documentation and track the status

of their applications. Local USDA service centers will also be available to provide in-person assistance to those who require help navigating the process. Officials have emphasized that the program is designed to deliver aid efficiently and equitably, ensuring that eligible farmers receive timely financial support.

As the economic landscape for agriculture continues to evolve, industry analysts are closely watching how this aid package will impact farm operations in the coming months. Some experts believe that while the relief funds will provide immediate support, long-term solutions will be necessary to address the structural challenges affecting commodity markets.

With applications for aid set to open this week, farmers across the country are preparing to apply for the much-needed support. The coming weeks will determine how effectively the USDA can implement the program and deliver relief to those most affected by the current economic conditions. As the program unfolds, both policymakers and farmers will be assessing its impact on the future of American agriculture.

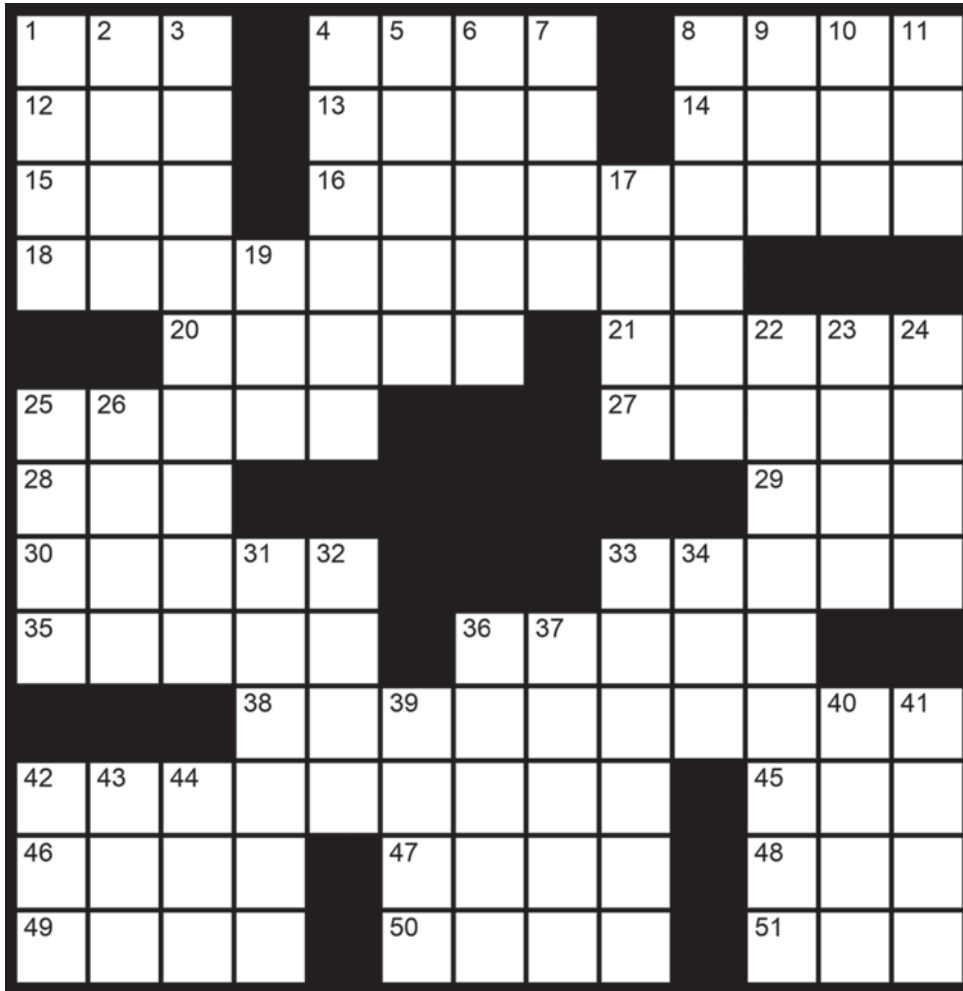

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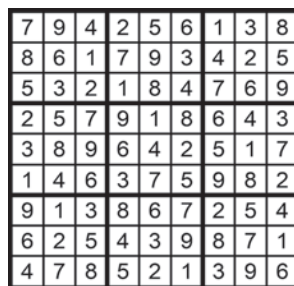
