Judge issues ruling in Pettis County landfill case

Circuit Court of Moniteau County Judge Kenneth M. Hayden issued an Oct. 8 ruling in Mid-Missouri Waste Systems, LLC et al. v. Pettis County, Missouri.

The Court invalidated key provisions of Pettis County's Solid Waste Management Order No. 01-2022, which effectively banned new landfill development.

The Pettis Community Commission declined to be interviewed about the decision, but released a statement Thursday, Oct. 9.

"The Pettis County Commission is reviewing the

recent ruling on the County's Solid Waste Management Order and is taking appropriate action," the statement read. "This decision represents a step in the ongoing legal process; the Commission is evaluating all available options moving forward. Our top priority continues to be

supporting the citizens of Pettis County and safeguarding the health, safety, and well-being of our communities. The Commission remains committed to ensuring that any future solid waste development aligns with the long-term well-being of Pettis County residents and the respon-

sible stewardship of our local environment. We will continue to work closely with our legal counsel and state partners to review the implications of this ruling and determine the best path ahead. Updates will be provided as available."

Sedalia breaks ground on new fire facilities, bowling alley

A crowd gathered in east Sedalia for the groundbreaking of Sedalia Fire Department's newest fire station, training facility, burn tower and Memory Lanes Bowling Alley on Wednesday, Oct. 8.

Sedalia City Administrator Matthew Wirt welcomed the citizens, dignitaries and well-wishers from a platform lined by earth-moving equipment south of Katy Depot.

"This very ground has a story to tell,"

Wirt told the gathering. "In the late 1800s and early 1900s, this area was alive with energy; freight trains, commerce and the hard-working men and women who helped build Sedalia's foundation."

While the rail yard is a thing of the past, the acreage sat empty for years until a deal was struck with Union Pacific for Sedalia to acquire the land.

"What we're doing here today is bringing new energy into this corner of our city," Wirt said. "And especially into Sedalia's east side. This project represents more than construction, it's an investment

in safety, in families and in the kind of community that has always defined us."

Philanthropist Sue Heckart's gift for the construction of Sedalia's new bowling alley was recognized and drew a standing ovation.

"Her generosity doesn't just build facilities," Wirt said. "It builds opportunities. Sue represents the very best of what it means to be made in Sedalia, hardworking, humble and committed to giving back."

Sacred Heart honors Coen Brown, raises awareness for childhood cancer

At intermission of the Sacred Heart School girls volleyball match on Monday, Oct. 6, the late Coen "Coco" Brown was honored with a small ceremony as part of the 2025 Childhood Cancer Awareness Game.

The volleyball team also presented Brown's siblings and parents, Matt and Nikki Brown, with a \$300 check for Coen's

Way, a non-profit organization started by Brown's mother.

The organization supports families enduring the challenges of a cancer diagnosis.

"Coco," a star basketball player at Sacred Heart who wore No. 12, died of cancer in May 2023. He is remembered as the school's all-time leading

scorer and the only player in the school's history to score over 2,000 points.

Sacred Heart Athletic Director Amanda Blackburn spoke to the crowd during the pause between the junior varsity and varsity games. Blackburn welcomed the Brown family and speaker Amy Epple to

the event, explaining that it is a student-driven event organized by the SHS volleyball team.

"I couldn't be more proud of them for recognizing something that has deeply impacted all of us in our time here at Sacred Heart," Blackburn said.

"A battle we fought alongside

our dear friend Coen, who left us in the early morning hours of May 24, 2023.

Blackburn added that each year, as school begins, she finds herself a "little heartsick" when she thinks of moments shared with Coen.


Barbara Anne Pile, 73, of Sedalia, passed away Wednesday, October 8, 2025, at University of Missouri Hospital in Columbia.

"Matthew has spent most of his time on the night shift being a dependable part of the team," Woolery said. "Along with regular patrol duties, there are several ancillary assignments at the Police Department, and Matt has volunteered to be a part of a few of the hardest."

Aragon was a member of the Special Response Team and is currently a DARE officer.

"While being a member of the SRT is a dangerous job," Woolery said. "DARE is definitely harder. Very few officers want to put in the work to teach DARE, and, in my opinion, DARE is the hardest two weeks in law enforcement."

Green Ridge High School junior Heath Snethen gave a Next To Rise student presentation on the "Show Me Smoke Free" campaign.

"Our long-term goal is to increase the number of

Missourians who are protected by 100% smoke and vape-free workplaces and public places," Snethen said.

The student invited council members to take an online survey on the need for comprehensive air protection and then pointed to the grim statistics regarding second-hand smoke.

"Exposure to secondhand smoke increases your risk of getting cancer by 20-30%," Snethen said. "It also kills 1,200 Missourians every year."

If enacted, smoke-free laws could save Sedalia residents a combined \$10.13 million, the student said.

A resolution waiving permit and water connection fees for Economic Development Sedalia-Pettis County's new headquarters construction passed unanimously.

The next agenda item, a resolution waiving per-

mit fees for a coffee shop remodel in the Donald C. Proctor Library at State Fair Community College, caused council discussion.

"I'm for waiving permit fees for anything as far as education and athletic activities," Ward Two Councilman Lee Scribner said. "A coffee shop is not something I'm willing to waive the fees on."

The request came from SFCC President Brent Bates, but ownership of the coffee shop was questioned.

"Any other business has to pay their way," Ward Three council Bob Hiller said. "So I want to know, who's benefiting from this coffee shop?"

A motion was made to postpone the matter until the next council meeting to give time to determine ownership of the SFCC coffee shop.

An equipment purchase passed unanimously for

\$55,253.01 with BlueAlly to provide IT Sophos Monitoring for Sedalia and forced an amendment to the FY 2025-2026 budget due to the price increase.

In the Public Works portion of the meeting, cemetery director Roger Waters and airport director Mitchell Mullen gave strategic planning presentations.

"These presentations are intended to begin the planning process by focusing on long-term visions, priorities and needs anticipated for fiscal year 2027," Public Works chairperson and Fourth Ward Councilwoman Michelle Franklin said. "Financial considerations remain an essential part of this process and will be developed in subsequent budget discussions once the strategic direction has been established."

Crown Hill Cemetery was founded in 1866 and has reportedly buried 25,010

people to date.

"Our current activity, through Sept. 25, we've had 76 burials," Waters said. "We've sold a total of 90 graves this year, so putting that in perspective, our average is about 70 over the last couple of years."

Steady growth has also been noted at the Sedalia Airport, according to the new director.

"The Sedalia Airport currently handles around 8,000 to 11,000 operations a year," Mullen said. "We have two runways, 18 hangars, 13 t-hangers and five box hangers with a total of 20 based aircraft, two twin-engine, 17 single-engine and one jet."

Mullen cited a 2012 economic impact study, the Sedalia airport has an annual economic impact of \$3.6 million.

It could happen to you

This past couple of days, I've watched women of all ages, all income levels, all ethnicities, walk around a huge building dedicated specifically to the disease they share - breast cancer.

Some have lost their hair. Some have ports surgically implanted in their bodies, there to deliver the life-saving elixir mixed with a potion that causes them fatigue, nausea, and near-death weakness. Some can barely walk. Some cannot walk and are wheeled around by family members or friends.

Regardless of their physical condition or the specifics of their disease, they are my sisters in a surreal play in which we numbly try to figure out how this happened.

Some of the women are young - in their 20s or 30s. Some are more middle-aged. Many are like me - long in the tooth and a more likely victim of this thing, like the creature in "Alien," that invaded our bodies and tried to kill us. We aged, though, are the lucky ones. We'll most likely be able to pay for our treatment, because we have government assistance through Medicare. Though it is true that I, and others like me, paid into Medicare for years, without the support of everyone who also pays into that fund, our treatment might be more difficult to pay for.

Treatment is astronomically expensive for the young patients. They haven't paid into Medicare for a lifetime and do not qualify for Medicare because of their youth, which should protect them from this fate, but hasn't. Many of them at least have some insurance, either paid by their or their spouse's employer, or by themselves through the Affordable Care Act (ACA), that will help them through.

The proclaimed "Big Beautiful Bill," however, is going to change their ability to buy that insurance through the ACA Exchange. The subsidies that help them pay for ACA insurance now, including tax breaks and a sliding scale for lower-income people, are set to expire at the end of the year. Estimates say that "expiration of the enhanced premium tax credits is estimated to more than double what subsidized enrollees currently pay annually for premiums—a 114% increase from an average of \$888 in 2025 to \$1,904 in 2026" (<https://www.kff.org/affordable-care-act/aca-marketplace-premium-payments-would-more-than-double-on-average-next-year-if-enhanced-premium-tax-credits-expire/>).

This works out to \$159/month as opposed to \$74/month.

The autism-Tylenol explainer: part 2

Does Tylenol "cause" autism? The real story is more complicated than either left or right want to believe. Last week I pointed out what government authorities aren't saying matters just as much as what they are. But what about the hard data underpinning arguments for and against an autism-Tylenol link?

Research exploring a connection between acetaminophen and autism predates the current controversy by decades and is easily available online. Most notably, in 2019, Johns Hopkins University in Maryland published a press release entitled, "Taking Tylenol during pregnancy associated with elevated risks for autism, ADHD: A Johns Hopkins study analyzing umbilical cord blood samples found that newborns with the highest exposure to acetaminophen were about three times more likely to be diagnosed with ADHD or autism spectrum disorder in childhood." The full text of this study is available through JAMA Psychiatry, a peer-reviewed medical journal. On the other hand, a larger 2024 study from Sweden found "acetaminophen use during pregnancy was not associated with children's risk of autism, ADHD, or intellectual disability." This study is also available through JAMA.

When it comes to dueling experts, who should you believe? Right now, opinions on acetaminophen and autism hew closely to political lines. But in the pursuit of truth, that's the least important factor to consider. Each study has its strengths and weaknesses.

First, the Johns Hopkins study strongly correlating acetaminophen and autism: This study was based on data from another, earlier study called the Boston Birth Cohort. The BBC was a 20-year analysis of American mothers and their children, starting at birth. In the strength column, the Hopkins study used objective data (umbilical cord blood samples) to form its conclusions, rather than more subjective results gleaned from interviews

Both studies accounted for a range of other factors that might potentially muddy the results, from maternal age and BMI to fever during pregnancy. Not all these factors were the same in both studies.

No matter what politicians say, from the research currently available, it is impossible to conclude with certainty for or against a causal link between acetaminophen usage in pregnancy and the development of autism in a child. Many other genetic and environmental variables could be at play. But is there enough data to urge pregnant women to take caution? The Trump administration certainly thinks so.

The FDA is updating its official guidance, adding warning labels to medications like Tylenol, and hopefully, funding new research that gets us closer to a definitive answer on the genesis of autism. All of these actions deserve bipartisan support.

In his controversial press announcement, RFK, Jr. said: "The FDA also recognized that acetaminophen is often the only tool for fevers and pain in pregnancy as other alternatives have well-documented adverse effects. HHS wants, therefore, to encourage clinicians to exercise their best judgment ... by prescribing the lowest effective dose for the shortest necessary and only when treatment is required ... the safety of acetaminophen against the risk of neurodevelopmental disorders in young children has never been validated. Prudent medicine therefore suggests caution in acetaminophen use by young children."

Behind the characteristically ham-fisted speech by Donald Trump and the partisan slap-fighting after the fact, the central message of the press conference could be boiled down thus:

Don't take acetaminophen unless you really have to. Be cautious when you do. It's still the best option we've got. We need to study it more.

I'm not sure why anyone would argue with that.

Her comments came just two weeks after the murder of



Derrick Standley, co-managing partner of Presidio Environmental, sees the court's ruling as a win for the proposed 95-acre landfill planned for rural Pettis County.

"Judge Hayden issued his preliminary ruling," Standley said. "It's my understanding it won't be final, there's still some potential for amendments to it, but Judge Hayden ruled the county did not have planning and zoning, they do not control their health code, and those provisions were struck."

Judge Kenneth M. Hayden held that Pettis County's order unlawfully conflicted with state law by prohibiting what the Missouri Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) expressly permits under Chapter 260 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri. The Court found that setback and exclusionary provisions, three-mile buffers and 1/2-mile dwelling setbacks rendered all viable landfill sites unavailable, and so are struck.

"The rest of the ruling pretty much went our way, which was not really a surprise," Standley said. "I think Judge Hayden did everything he could to try to rule with the county, but at the end of the day, the county's ordinance was so outrageous that it was frankly a waste of the county's money

to litigate, I mean, they've just cost the taxpayers a fortune."

Presidio Environmental sent a snapshot of the court ruling's impact on the investor's project.

"The Pettis County judgment materially strengthens investor confidence in state-level environmental permitting," the statement said. "It signals a rebalancing of regulatory power toward state oversight and away from politically reactive local governments—creating a favorable landscape for scalable waste and circular-economy investments."

While Pettis County Commissioners ponder the county's next move to keep the trash out, Presidio partners are seeing this as another move towards a new landfill near Dresden.

"In my read of it, as a non-attorney, it looks like we can proceed," Standley said. "This is all very fresh, and we're still trying to look at it. You would think at some point the county would say, 'Enough is enough,' and come back and talk. The county has yet to ever talk to us, which is just bizarre."

Pettis County Commissioners said they would revisit the issue after obtaining further advice from their council.

Mayor Andrew Dawson noted the groundbreaking was the result of years of work and dedicated vision by former Mayor John Kehde, the city administration and City Council.

"They saw the potential in this very piece of land," Wirt said. "They had the foresight to look past what it was and imagine what it could be; something beautiful, something meaningful, something that serves the people."

The east side projects are part of a larger transformation of the area.

"We've seen businesses emerge, new opportunities take root and vital community resources grow around us," Dawson said. "Just to the north, the Boys & Girls Club and Pettis County Community Partnership are expanding their presence, and right here we're laying the foundation not just for the fire station, the training center, for the future of the Aquatic Center and of course, our new bowling alley."

Dawson called the project the capstone of those efforts, and said Heckart's \$6 million donation was nothing short of extraordinary.

Sedalia Fire Department Chief Matt Irwin thanked Sedalians for their support for the fire station, which was first planned five years ago.

"We were faced with many questions," Irwin said. "The biggest of which, 'How do we build a facility that meets our current needs and will continue to serve this community and meet the fire department's needs 20 years, 30 years and beyond?'

Irwin credited numerous conversations with architects, designers,

and fire departments across the region for invaluable insights, many of which were incorporated into the new fire station.

"Its capabilities are limitless, from training new recruits fresh out of high school to sharpening the skills of even the most seasoned professional," Irwin said. "This is something we can all be proud of, not just within the department but throughout this community."

Vice president and project architect with Hoefer Welker Katherine Waldrop took a photo from the podium of the large crowd and thanked them for the project.

"When somebody asks me what I'm working on lately, I get to say a fire station, a fire training building, a fire burn tower, a bowling alley, an e-sports facility and an aquatic center all-in-one," Waldrop said. "That is truly the vision of Sedalia; it is so forward-thinking and so futuristic to put all these community functions on one plot of land."

Mitchell Fuemmeler, General Manager with Nabholz Construction, mentioned the local subcontractors who will be helping with construction.

"If anybody isn't familiar with our regional company, we've got Columbia, Kansas City and Springfield offices, but we're excited to be building Sedalia's community, we're down the road at State Fair [Governor Mike Parsons] Arena and then our on-site Superintendent Tim Warner is from the community here," Fuemmeler said. "Building our communities is one of our values, and this project definitely speaks to that. We will have 20-25 subcontractors, and each of those companies are hiring local people

to bring these projects to reality. So, make sure if you hear somebody involved in this project or see them out here today, thank them for what they're about to undertake."

A one-year construction cycle leaves an opening planned in the fall of 2026. Amy Apple, Director of Parks and Recreation, made sure to give credit where credit was due.

"Sue Heckart is a name that resonates with compassion and commitment within our community," Apple said. "Sue has always been known for her giving spirit and today we celebrate her significant multi-million-dollar gift that will fund the building at the bowling alley."

Apple noted Heckart's gift will provide years of family entertainment and allow kids, families, seniors and friends to spend time together celebrating events and create lasting memories. Apple then teased further expansion of the area.

"Looking to the future, we are excited about the development of a new aquatic facility slated to open in a few years right here on this property. Just like Memory Lanes, this facility will serve as a cornerstone of recreation for our community," Apple said.

Heckart told the crowd that memories are the shared experiences that help form friendships.

"Memories help us build community by uniting us around a shared purpose, and fond memories comfort us when we need them most," Heckart said. "Life is a snapshot of memories. I hope that Memory Lanes will be a place that captures many memories for you."

"And how he was truly larger than life," Blackburn said. "He challenged me to be the best that I could for our students and our school—in good times and in bad. His absence is felt every single day. Not a day goes by that he isn't still part of our lives. Whether it's the large number of the No. 12 that I recognize almost everywhere I go or as I walk down the hallway and remember our many interactions at school that bonded me with a great opportunity for mentorship."

Blackburn added that as

a community, Sacred Heart supported Brown before and after he was sick. She noted as she thought about what she wanted to say on Monday night, one word came to her again and again—"extraordinary."

"Coen lived larger than life in everything that he did," Blackburn said. "He left a legacy and a mark on this world that will never be erased."

Blackburn added that when Coen encountered "the great matchup of his life," he didn't waver.

"He chose to fight and be

extraordinary," Blackburn said. "Even in his final days, Coen was extraordinary."

She added that the goal of the night was awareness for families that are living with a childhood cancer "nightmare."

"But also, awareness that light can be found in the darkness," Blackburn said. "Through Coen's journey, this family created an organization that does just that—it brings light through the dark through Coen's Way."

Blackburn introduced Epple, who spoke on behalf of Coen's mother and family. Epple noted that Nikki

Brown wrote the words from her heart.

"There are certain places throughout our lives that become more than just a school or a building," Epple read. "For us, Sacred Heart is certainly that. I often call it our home away from home."

Coen's mother wanted to share the role the community played in Coen's story.

As the family's lives turned upside down with Coen's diagnosis of a rare and fatal cancer, the school and the Sacred Heart community set a standard for others.

It all began with a prayer

vigil in the Sacred Heart gym in July 2022.

"From there, Sacred Heart became a lifeline," Epple read. "This school fed the Brown family for 14 months. When they weren't home for practices or games, you gave their kids rides. When the laundry pulled up and the house fell apart, you sent clean towels and restocked the bathrooms. When the food outgrew [the] fridge, you bought another one. When that was full, you bought a freezer."

The school also helped Coen get another car when his broke down. The SHS family and community took Coen's siblings shopping, cleaned the house, and offered their homes for sleepovers. The school also challenged local businesses to match its giving in support of the Browns. Due to the challenge, other school communities became involved, such as Cole Camp, Smithton, Northwest, La Monte, Smith-Cotton, Tipton, Lincoln, and Windsor.

"Students from all those schools started fundraising for Coen," Epple read. "They sent letters, made shirts and bracelets [and] even hosted basketball camps in his name."

Due to the numerous donations, the family was able to cover gasoline expenses, hotel stays, and meals while Coen was ill. In her notes

read by Epple, Nikki Brown said that when the family was in the "fight for their lives," they had people who kept showing up and people who kept giving and loving.

"The Browns will never forget the way Sacred Heart students showed up in person," Epple read. "Many came and stayed with Coen and the family in the hospital—young people choosing to sit with suffering instead of turning away from it."

Epple added that when Coen died, his mother knew she couldn't let the story end there because of all the love and service in action shown to the family. Because of this, she began Coen's Way.

"She serves the way that Sacred Heart all served," Epple said. "Hands-on, personal, and intentional. We tell Coen's story because through it, people can see Christ's love and goodness in the middle of something so painful."

Epple closed with one of Nikki Brown's favorite thoughts about Coen.

"If you knew him, you'd know how much he loved a little bit of fire—just kidding, he was all fire," Epple read.

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
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THIS WEEK IN WEATHER HISTORY

Scholl sets two new records for Smith-Cotton boys swimming

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A year ago, Aiden Scholl was agonizingly close to breaking Smith-Cotton boys swimming's longest-standing record.

That frustration finally turned to triumph when the S-C senior smashed the 35-year-old 100-yard breaststroke record by nearly two seconds while also setting a new 100-yard freestyle mark at the COMO Invitational at the Mizzou Aquatic Center on Friday, Oct. 3, and Saturday, Oct. 4.

"It's amazing," Scholl said. "It really does feel good to finally accomplish something I feel like. It was good."

Scholl broke the 100 breaststroke record with a time of 1:03.28 on Friday. The previous record was 1:05.13 set by Jerry Tankersley, who now serves as Smith-Cotton High School's assistant principal, in 1990.

The mark was good for 20th at the meet, but ranks 12th on the MSHSAA Class 1 state performance list.

"I honestly felt slower than I expected," Scholl said. "I didn't expect a 1:03, and my team didn't know what to say. I didn't know what to say at the time and I thought I was going to add time at that rate, but I didn't at all. I got rid of two seconds easily at Mizzou, so I think it was all just at the pool and that was the time for me to break it."

Scholl said he was .2 seconds away from breaking the record last season and that it was one of his goals to get it this season.

"I wanted to get that record so bad," Scholl said. "It's great. I wish I would have broken it last year, but at least I got it over with at the beginning of the season, which was nice."

The breaststroke record was only half of Scholl's record-setting weekend, as he returned to the pool Saturday to take down the 100

freestyle record.

Scholl set the record with a time of 49.22, breaking Findlay Hume's 2023 record of 49.28.

"I thought I didn't break it at the finals," Scholl said. "I thought I added time actually, and I was not very happy. Then, my coach told me I broke the record and I was really surprised. I didn't know what to say at the time. I'm really happy I broke that record. Very happy."

The time placed Scholl

12th at the meet and ranks 13th on the MSHSAA Class 1 state performance list.

All in all, Scholl said it is amazing to get his name on the record board twice.

"It feels really nice," Scholl said. "[The breaststroke] record was held for 35 years. It's something different. I mean, he is my principal, which I guess is even more cool. And the other record for the 100 free, it was set in 2023 and it felt really good to get that record out of the way because that

was my first goal to get that record. It was really cool. Then the environment I was at — Mizzou — it was a really cool place for me, and it was definitely the time for me to break it."

S-C head swim and dive coach Samantha Yewell added that the records are proof of Scholl's growth over the years.

"I've been his coach for three years now, so I've seen him almost since the beginning of his high school career," Yewell said. "He's just made leaps and bounds of improvement every year. Last year, he was consistently within like hundredths of a second of [the breaststroke] record. He was getting so frustrated and then to see him absolutely smash it by two seconds was awesome. Then the next day, seeing him get the 100 freestyle one was just so cool."

Now that he owns the two records, Scholl has his sights set on breaking two other records: the 100 butterfly and the 50 free.

Equally important, however, Scholl said he is determined to reach the state podium this year.

Scholl has qualified for state each of the last two seasons.

"I think this year I'm ready to make the finals, finally, and go for the 100 free again and the 100 back," Scholl said. "I can make the finals and get to the top eight. I just feel really good. That's what I want to do is make the finals for state."

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WINE FROM THE VINE

The perfect time for wine dinners

JoAnn and I recently donated a wine dinner for six to a local bazaar. Numerous people asked what we were doing and what we were serving, so I decided to devote this column to wine dinners.

What are the basics for a good wine dinner? Specialty foods paired with various wines. We like to serve five to seven courses. The idea behind specialty foods is to select a theme (usually a country) and dishes that are not part of the common restaurants. The wine to serve is about two ounces per course, as it is a tasting (seven glasses of wine at the normal fill level would make it dangerous to drive). You actually consume about two glasses of wine. Perhaps a little port as an aperitif and a shot of schnapps at the end.

I like to start with an aperitif like port wine. Serve at room temperature. The older the better, but nothing less than 10 years and over 100 is better. Ports are always sold up to 4-500 years old. The older the wine, the more expensive it is. Use red port, not white.

The first course is usually a salad (bowing to American style, in many countries, the salad comes last). The salad should be interesting and not just shredded lettuce. We like to do Austrian dinners, and so we start with a gemischte salat. This has a couple of leaves of lettuce, potato salad, red cabbage, radish, and boiled egg. We pair this with crisp white wine like Pinot Gris or Pinot Grigio, Pinot Blanc, or Grüner Veltliner. Serve chilled. Don't forget the bread (again, American caveat). We like to use homemade brown molasses bread or sourdough.

The second course is a soup. Different locals have different specialties, and thus, they must match your theme. We like to make a grissinocell suppe which uses a clear broth as the base. Match this with an Orvieto (Italy) white wine. Serve chilled. Generally, mild acidic whites work best with soup.

Next is a sorbet. Any flavor of sherbert, small scoop. Serve with a rose. Wines from Provence, France, are the best. They are a blend of Grenache, Cinsault, and Syrah. Serve chilled.

Now comes the main course. Depending on the theme, which will dictate what wine to use. A shortcut is Chianti for Italian, Cabernet, Syrah, Grenache, Pinot Noir, and Malbec for most beef. It depends on the spice and sauces. We like to serve Tafelspitz. In English, Tafelspitz can be translated as "boiled beef" or the specific beef cut "cap of rump" or "topside." The name refers to both the cut of beef, a triangular piece from the base of the loin that is similar to a tri-tip, and the Austrian dish itself, which involves slowly boiling this meat in a flavorful broth with root vegetables. The bone is left in for the marrow. Carrots and potatoes are included in the slow boil. Often, cream of spinach is served as a side.

Wine dinners can easily be made vegetarian by making a gemüsestrudel. A vegetable strudel using phyllo dough or fish, in which case only white wines are paired.

Dessert is hard to choose as there are so many good ones. We like to serve an Austrian delicacy, Sachertorte. According to information supplied by Wikipedia, "Sachertorte is a chocolate sponge cake covered with chocolate glaze, with an interior layer of apricot jam either under the glaze or in the middle of two sponge layers. The cake was invented by Franz Sacher, either in 1832 for Austrian chancellor Klemens von Metternich, or perhaps in the 1840s.

"The cake is served at Hotel Sacher and the Demel pastry shop in Vienna. In the 20th century, they battled over the cake's ownership and whether the cake should have one or two layers of sponge. Both keep their exact recipes secret, but the cake's ingredients include butter, chocolate, eggs, flour, and sugar. Hotel Sacher serves the cake with whipped cream."

Desserts should be paired with sweet wines. We serve not only a sweet but also a rich white wine from Austria, called a Beerenauslese or a Trockenbeerenauslese.

The seventh course would be a cheese platter paired with a dry white wine.

The finale would be a shot of Austrian, German, or Swiss schnapps as a digestive.

Don't be afraid to try your own wine dinner(s) with friends. Wine shops should be able to help with pairings. You can also use Google, but pay attention to the grape varietal, rather than the vintner or name on the bottle. This is particularly important if you are in an area without dedicated, trained personnel in its shops.

Cost? In Kansas City, St. Louis, or even Columbia, expect to pay well over \$100 per person for wine dinners as I described. You can expect to prepare a home wine dinner for considerably less. Four to six is a nice number of guests. Add a little marketing pizazz by creating a printed menu with descriptions of the food and wine. Need help, email me.

Buttermilk Forty Suri Alpacas welcomes visitors, agritourism

Beginning an alpaca farm is no easy feat, but two Pettis County residents decided to give it a try and are pleased with the outcome, and plan to expand agritourism in the area.

Steven Crane and Jennifer Crane, owners of Buttermilk Forty Suri Alpacas, began their journey three years ago. Their ranch sits on 45 acres north of Clifton City in northeastern Pettis County.

Steven, a retired U.S. Air Force veteran, is a barber at Bob Taylor's Barber Shop, and Jennifer is a math instructor at State Fair Community College.

The beginnings of an alpaca ranch

In areas where there are streams or wooded corridors surrounded by farmland, more deer may be present to cross roadways. Remember: Rural areas are not the only place where deer/vehicle strikes occur. In 2024 21.1 percent of the traffic crashes involving deer happened in urban areas.

Jennifer Crane added that alpacas behave more like cats while llamas behave more like dogs.

"A llama can be a guard animal for livestock, but an alpaca needs a guard," Jennifer Crane said. "So that's why we have the dogs."

The couple has two guard dogs, Josey and Dwight, which are a mix between Great Pyrenees, Anatolian Shepherd, and Akbash. The dogs prevent coyotes and other predators from harming the alpacas.

"The biggest threat to alpacas is domestic dogs," Steven Crane said.

The benefits of alpaca fiber

Steven Crane added that their long-term plan for the ranch is to sell good seed stock.

"We go to shows and we get judged on our animals," Steven Crane said. "We try to build their resume. That way we can get our name out there — it's good advertising."

By attending shows, other farms also become familiar with their ranch.

Jennifer Crane added that alpaca fur is called fiber, not wool, and is a fantastic product. She and her husband have an alpaca fiber store in their home, where they sell scarves, socks, gloves, dryer balls, hats, yarn and other items made from alpaca fiber. Many of the items make great gifts. The shop is open by appointment.

"They are shorn once a year in the spring," Jennifer Crane said of their herd. "And then we send our fiber off to a mill, and we have it processed into roving. Which is basically a long, thin strip of fiber that a spinner will use with a drop spindle or spinning

wheel. And then they spin it into yarn from there. And we also have it made into yarn."

Jennifer Crane noted that 15 pounds of alpaca fiber makes around 100 pairs of socks. Besides selling items from their alpacas, they sell imported items from Peru, Bolivia and Ecuador. Alpacas come in 22 natural colors from white to black.

Alpaca fiber is hypoallergenic, warmer than sheep's wool, repels water and is softer than cashmere but durable.

The couple said their most significant achievement at the ranch was the birth of their first baby alpaca, Kenai, born in June 2024.

"She was the first one that we actually owned and bred," Steven Crane said. "And she's really nice, and she's a nice quality animal — so that makes us happy."

Agritourism focus

As for the agritourism focus, the couple has already implemented an aspect of that. The Cranes are part of the Harvest Hosts and RV Overnights organizations that welcome RV guests who are members of those programs to visit and stay for a night, and enjoy a farm tour and shopping experience. All RVs must be self-contained.

"They can book up to six months ahead of time or the day of," Jennifer Crane said. "The trade-off with Harvest Hosts is to at least allow them to boondock on your property for free; (and) they're supposed to patronize your business and spend about \$30."

RVers receive a tour, can hand-feed the animals, go into the enclosures, and visit the fiber store. Jennifer Crane said it's going well, and they've had around 50 guests

each summer the last two years. The RV season stretches from March through October.

The Cranes also offer private family tours for \$5 per person, ages two and up. Steven added that the ranch is insured. The Cranes are planning a Christmas event where they hope to have Santa and Mrs. Claus available, and those visiting can go on a self-guided tour and check out the fiber shop.


