## Veterans story is far-reaching

*(Editor's Note: On July 4, 1776, the Second Continental Congress unanimously adopted the Declaration of Independence, announcing colonies' separation from Great Britain. Independence Day is a federal holiday commemorating the Declaration of Independence, which was ratified by the Second Continental Congress on July 4, 1776, establishing the United States of America. It's only fitting that we focus on the sacrifices our veterans have made over the decades for our freedom.)*

The Lake Sun published a Memorial Day 2023 article titled Tom Boyce, Memorial Day, Freedom, and the Ultimate Sacrifice which had surprising and far-reaching impact.

The story was about Sunrise Beach resident and United States Army 11-B Infantry SP4-E4 Tom Boyce's military experience and his good friend, United States Army 11-B SP4-E4 Infantryman Mateo Ruelas, who paid the ultimate sacrifice.

### The original article

Tom and Mateo served in the Army Selective Service 1st Cav Division (AMBL) together during the Vietnam War. Tom entered the service in 1969 at the age of 19. He was a sharpshooter marksman.

On May 16, 1970, the 11-B Infantry were ordered to the front lines in Cambodia to take a North Vietnamese supply depot. Attempts to move forward were thwarted multiple times as they were ambushed and pushed back by enemy forces. The 11-B Infantry suffered severe casualties. Only four out of nine made it out alive.

Boyce was shot and medevacked by heli-

copter to a hospital. He took shrapnel in his lung from an M-16, lost half of a thumb and was shot in the wrist. He also suffered from post-traumatic stress disorder.

His friend, Mateo Ruelas, paid the ultimate sacrifice. He was a hostile ground casualty, receiving multiple fragmentation wounds. Mateo was from Alice, Texas. He was born on Sept. 29, 1949. He died at the age of 20, on May 16, 1970, courageously serving his country.

### The sequel

The week after the article was published, Boyce received a telephone call from Mateo's brother in Arizona. He had read the story. He said Mateo had a daughter that he was only able to see once before he died, and now he has several great-grandchildren.

"He told me he appreciated Mateo being honored for his sacrifice for our country," Boyce said. "He could not believe someone remembered and talked about him. He was grateful. It helped him to find some

closure."

### Giving honor where honor is due

Boyce also received a letter in the mail from Missouri State Sen. Mike Bernskoetter (R-District 6) and Missouri State Rep. Willard Haley (R-District 58), with a laminated copy of the news article.

"It is so important to honor men and women like yourself who gave of themselves and those who continue to do so, so that our freedoms are protected," Sen. Bernskoetter wrote. "We should never forget the sacrifices made on our behalf. Our country's greatness is built on the foundation of courage and strength from men and women like yourself who have served and continue to serve. We salute you - we honor you!"

### The American Legion

The article was also read at the American Legion Zack Wheat Post No. 624 Memorial Day Service on Monday, May 29, in Sunrise Beach. It was read in recognition and honor of Mateo and to honor all the service men and women who have paid the ultimate price.

Vietnam veterans have not always been honored.

"When Vietnam veterans came home after the war people were very disrespectful towards them," Boyce recalled. "Many soldiers returning from Vietnam would not wear their uniform," Tom revealed. "If they did, they were ridiculed, spit on and called baby killers. That was wrong. They were over there defending our freedom and because some politician, or other anti-war organization, did not like the war they told lies and said things happened that never

## Camden County

### Library nixes branch closing rumors

The Camden County Library Board met on June 16 where discussion on possibly closing rural library locations took place during a closed session — raising eyebrows from both the Camden County Commission as well as residents of the library's satellite locations.

During the commission's June 28 work session, 2nd District Commissioner Don Williams said the library board went into closed session to discuss real estate, an allowable exception to the Missouri Sunshine Law. But it was re-

vealed later that the discussion actually revolved around the idea of closing library locations in Stoutland, Macks Creek and Climax Springs.

Williams gave his opinion on the matter, stating, "If they're going to close these libraries, then they need to redraw the library district so taxpayers are not forced to support a library that doesn't support them. You know, it's a huge step backwards. And many years ago all we had was like one in Camdenton and we had one in Osage Beach — and if you lived out in Macks Creek or Stoutland you had to depend on the bookmobile to come around once in

a while. That was all you had."

He added that closing these rural libraries would also affect individuals and families who don't have access to internet.

"You know, nowadays, most people who have internet, you've got a whole world of information at your fingertips — but people living out in these areas, a lot of them don't have internet. So the libraries are a lot more important to them than they are to somebody living here in Camdenton," Williams said.

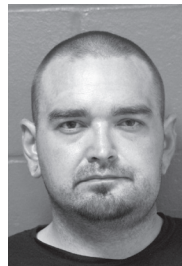
During the execution of the warrant, deputies located approximately 50 grams of methamphetamine, prescription pills and drug paraphernalia

## Only you can prevent a fire

With ongoing drought conditions around state, the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds everyone to be extra careful with fireworks, campfires and other sources of fire that could cause a wildfire.

## FIREWORKS:

Don't light fireworks in any areas where the sparks could ignite dry grass, leaves or other potential fire fuel. Always have an approved fire extinguisher and an available water supply to douse sparks or flames. Wet the area around where fireworks are being discharged. Check with local ordinances and authorities for bans on fireworks and open burning.

## OUTDOOR BURNING:

Don't burn during wrong conditions. Dry grass, high temperatures, low humidity and wind make fire nearly impossible to control. Check with local fire departments regarding burn bans that may be in place. A person who starts a fire for any reason is responsible for any damage it may cause.

## DRIVING OFF ROAD:

Wildfires can start when dry fuel, such as grass, comes in contact with catalytic converters. Think twice before driving into and across a grassy field. Never park over tall, dry grass or piles of leaves that can touch the underside of a vehicle. When driving vehicles off road, regularly inspect the undercarriage to ensure that fuel and brake lines are intact, and no oil leaks are apparent. Always carry an approved fire extinguisher on vehicles that are used off road. Check for the presence of spark arresters on ATV exhausts.

## MAKING A CAMPFIRE:

Clear a generous zone around fire rings. Store unused firewood a good distance from a campfire. Never use gasoline, kerosene or other flammable liquid to start a fire. Keep campfires small and controllable. Keep fire-extinguishing materials, such as a rake, shovel and bucket of water close. Extinguish campfires each night and before leaving camp, even if it's just for a few moments. ## CALL FOR HELP:

Call 911 at the first sign of a fire getting out of control.

## REPORT FIRES:

ARSON: Wildfires are sometimes set by vandals. Help stop arson by calling 800-392-1111 and reporting any potential arson activities. Callers will remain anonymous, and rewards are possible.

## PRESCRIBED FIRE:

Fire used in the wrong way can create disasters. Used in the right way, fire can help create habitat for wildlife. happened. I never saw all the things they claimed went on in the Vietnam war."

"They said we were baby killers. The truth is the North Vietnamese would bomb an entire village to punish the men in the village that would not be encrypted into service, and they would blame it on American soldiers," Boyce clarified. "They would give grenades to children, who did not know what they were, and blame it on our guys."

"John Kerry did a great disservice when he said our soldiers acted in the same fashion as Genghis Khan. He said they raped villagers. They did not. There was one case where a platoon was ordered to go into a village because the North Vietnamese military were embedded there. They had been ambushing and killing America soldiers. In that case, they killed an entire village, but they were court marshaled for their actions."

"I am proud of my military service. I came back to the states and joined the reserves to serve for an additional 27 years because it is my duty to serve my country, as did my father and 11 of my uncles."

### The American way

"America is a unique country," Boyce's wife, Jane Boyce, said. "We are allowed to live in peace in a diverse community—side-by-side, with people of all races and religions. This country is based on independence, freedom and liberty. No other country originated with the fine principles found in the United States Constitution."

"There are people who want to take over America and make it a communist nation," Tom said. "If we do not continue

to keep a strong military, we will lose our freedom to speak our mind, to assemble, to work and to go to school where we choose. In other nations, if you do these things, you can be arrested, imprisoned, and worse." "If a country thinks we are weak, they will try to take over," Tom warned. "They are already trying to strip away our guns and our freedom of speech. If what we say is not politically correct, we are told to shut up. We must ensure righteous men and women are elected to positions of authority, to govern over us so we, and our children, can continue to live in peace, and we can pass down the opportunity to live in the greatest nation in the world to our grandchildren."

Boyce now serves in the American Legion Zack Wheat Post No. 624 Color Guard in Sunrise Beach to continue to serve and take care of veterans. The Color Guard posts the colors at veteran funerals. "Posting the colors at a funeral honors the veteran and helps the family to recognize the important service of the deceased in protect-

ing our nation," Tom explained.

As the largest veteran assistance service in the nation, the American Legion's primary mission is to ensure Veterans have the healthcare and other assistance they earned. The post offers veterans legal assistance, filling out medical paperwork, medical equipment, emergency financial assistance and more.

The Legion also offers homemade meals and fun events. The public can also attend at the invitation of a veteran. "The American Legion is like an extended family," Boyce said. "It places veterans with other veterans. These guys went through hell, and when you go through hell together, it creates a bond."

Boyce urges veterans to join the Legion family. Any veteran honorably discharged after Dec. 7, 1941, can join. "We can be there for each other," Boyce said. "No one understands what a veteran is going through like another veteran."

Skelton stated that he had written a letter to the board expressing that he believed their recent meeting was an improper use of the closed session rules and recommended they contact the attorney general and get a class on open meetings.

After the issue showed up in social media, county resident Kathy Bolch emailed the library board, carbon copying the Camden County Commission and Mike Davis, director of the Camden County Library, sharing her opposition to closing library locations.

### "Dear Board Members,

I am writing to voice both my disapproval, discontent, and alarm at your proposed closing of the libraries in Stoutland, Climax Springs, and Macks Creek. These libraries provide

a vital service to the rural communities that they serve. They are there as a gathering place for residents at Book Clubs, programs provided, services to children like Summer Reading and After School programs, and other employment are helping to teach the kids how to read and learn to enjoy reading. Many families in these communities do not have vehicles to drive to bigger towns nor the finances to afford gas and so walking to the library is vitally important to them. It is education in the purest form, and should never be taken away.

Also and importantly, tax dollars are used to support the library, thereby making it MY library. I was appalled to read that some of the Board believes that this should be handled in a closed session. All involved citizens should have the right to stay informed, and you seem to be trying to take that away.

### No closings

In a post on the Camden County Library District Facebook page, Davis said the satellite locations would not close. He said:

"I would like to take this time to address the rumor that Camden County Library District is closing branches. Like you, inflation has taken its toll on the library's finances. Among many cost saving proposals, one that was considered was closing a branch. We have decided against this. The board and I would like to thank those who have taken the time to contact us about this consideration. We thank you for your support and look forward to serving public at all six branches of the Camden County Library District."

"Again, no branches of the Camden County Library District will be permanently closed."



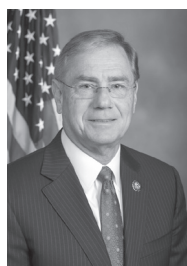

## Protecting Education Privacy

There was a lot going on this week in Washington as our seven-week legislative session came to an end and we head into our next District Work Period. There were several hearings with Administration officials; we had Fed Chairman Jay Powell in the House Financial Services Committee and Small Business Administration officials in the House Small Business Committee.

In addition to hearings and floor activity, I held a telephone town hall on Wednesday and was glad to get the chance to speak with many of you. Thank you to those of you who participated. These calls are a great way for me to hear your concerns directly and I always enjoy getting to catch up. Especially now that the Third District has changed a little bit, it was great to have some new callers on the line and participate in this forum. Whether you need help with something like social security or a passport for an upcoming trip, you'd like to share your opinions, or you just want to hear my stance on a specific issue, these calls are a great way to connect and hear straight from you. Due to capacity limits on the telephone town halls, we cannot call everyone in the district. However, if you're interested in joining me on our next call, please click here to sign up: tele-town hall signup.

In an effort to protect students in Missouri and across the country from having their personal information shared without their consent, I introduced the Protecting Education Privacy Act this week. This bill will strengthen federal student privacy standards and empower parents by giving them more control over their child's sensitive information. In 2011, the Department of Education made sweeping regulatory changes

to the Federal Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). These changes significantly diminished student privacy protections and gave multiple entities unwarranted access to student records. Groups like trade unions and tech companies have absolutely no business using American students' school records to obtain their test scores, attendance records, social security numbers, or sensitive health information without the students' and parents' consent. But this has been possible under current laws. My bill will put enhanced safeguards in place for student records and prohibit the use of personally identifiable information for commercial purposes. Students and parents should feel safe providing schools with necessary personal information, and this bill will help restore peace of mind that this information will remain confidential - as it should.

I also introduced the Ukraine Reconstruction Accountability and Transparency Act which would prevent companies from countries that actively supported Russia's efforts to invade Ukraine from benefiting from reconstruction efforts. For example, companies located in countries like China, Belarus, and North Korea - whose governments have provided material or diplomatic support for the Russian invasion of Ukraine - will not be permitted to enter into Ukraine reconstruction contracts that utilize financing from the World Bank, International Monetary Fund, and other International Financial Institutions. It has been devastating to watch Putin's destruction of Ukraine, and the countries who have aided Russia's efforts should absolutely not be benefiting from Ukraine's rehabilitation. As the Chairman of the Subcommittee on National Security, Illicit Finance, and International Financial Institutions, I have direct oversight over U.S. involvement of those institutions, and intend to use our country's sizable voice, vote, and influence to restrict Putin's allies from participating in and making money off the destruction they so eagerly supported.

Lastly, on the House floor, we

passed several good pieces of legislation. For example, the CHOICE Arrangement Act helps small businesses support their employees by enhancing flexibility and affordability with their health care options. According to the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB), the cost of health insurance has remained a top issue for American small businesses for 32 years in a row - it's clear something needs to be done. Over the last several years, policies like Obamacare have caused major problems in the individual health market that covers only 4.6% of the population yet costs American taxpayers over a trillion dollars a year. This misguided use of taxpayer dollars is completely reckless and puts our nation's small businesses in a terrible position for providing their employees with coverage. The CHOICE Arrangement Act expands association health plans so that small businesses, independent contractors, and self-employed Americans can pool together and negotiate as a single health plan, allowing them the same health benefit flexibility and affordability as our nation's larger businesses. It will also help get some health care regulatory burdens out of the way which, as I've discussed before, can be crippling to small businesses who don't have the resources or time to deal with them.

Small businesses are the drivers of our local economies and work force and as the Vice Chairman of the House Small Business Committee, providing them with the tools for success is extremely important to me. Enabling them to provide their employees with quality, affordable health care so they can take care of themselves and their families is a major part of that.

## A path to depolarization

Kevin Vallier is speaking at the Acton Institute's annual international gathering of nonprofit, faith-based leaders. The Institute is named after the 19th-century Englishman Lord Acton, known best for the quote "Power corrupts. Absolute power corrupts absolutely." The Institute's also motivated by Acton's admonition: "Liberty is not the power of doing what we like, but the right of being able to do what we ought."

Vallier is talking about the so-called culture wars and politics, in which both sides are prone to extreme hyperbole. The rancor and rhetoric have only increased since the Supreme Court overturned the decision that made abortion a federally guaranteed right.

"I think violence always damages us," Vallier says, "even if we use it justifiably. I think that is not just true for soldiers who bear the wounds of the violence they have been forced to use, I think it's true of politicians." He adds: "What is the use of violence in politics

going to do to us, even if we win? Especially if we win. What will we become? Who will we be? Who will be more like Christ in the end?"

As I listen to Vallier talk about violence and the harm it does, I think about the obvious political violence we've seen -- the Jan. 6 Capitol riots and the unrest over police brutality in several cities. But I also think of the violence of abortion and the suffering it causes -- including to our politics.

Vallier is the author of a book called "Trust in a Polarized Age" and an associate professor at Bowling Green State University. And he clearly feels called to the thankless task of reminding people that there is more to life than politics.

"Every ideological tradition distorts things about others," Vallier said. He emphasizes that we all have biases, and most of us don't fully -- or even partially -- understand the other side's point of view.

Just shortly after listening to Vallier's talk, I turned on an interview between MSNBC host Joy Reid and Vice President Kamala Harris. I could feel my blood pressure rise, and I went to Twitter for a good rant. But I stopped myself. Abortion will never be ended via Twitter. And arguing over social media will contribute to making people the worst versions of themselves.

Speaking directly to Christians, Vallier speaks about the priority of Jesus. He must come before politics. And there's a certain freedom that comes from the fact that "the

Gospel does not fit any ideological traditions... Christ defies our ideologies... He disrupts them."

Years ago, now-retired Catholic Philadelphia Archbishop Charles J. Chaput made the point that the Democrats should have never become the party of abortion because so many Catholics were Democrats. Obviously, President Joe Biden and others do not accept Church teaching on abortion. Some people want to see pro-choice Catholics denied Communion. The latter is above my pay grade. But are there things that Christians who disagree on abortion could do to help women, while continuing to disagree about abortion.

Don't get me wrong: I want it to end abortion in America. But I also realize that many people don't agree with me. I want lives saved, but there are also people languishing -- including children in the foster care system. Can we meet in less-charged places and work to find common ground? It could be healing.

**Q What is an 'alignment' and how do I know if I need one?**

**A** In the simplest terms, an alignment is the process of adjusting the angle of the wheels on your car. Getting an alignment not only reduces uneven tire wear (thus prolonging the life of your tires), but also ensures your vehicle is traveling straight and not 'pulling' or veering to one side. There are typically three different 'angles' or 'tilts' that need checked and adjusted. The camber is the outward or inward tilt of the tire when looking at your car 'head on', the caster is the front or rear tilt when looking from the side, and toe refers to the way

tires are pointed when looking from above.

A few signs to look for which indicate you may need an alignment are tires with uneven wear, feeling the car 'pull' to the right or left when driving, and the steering wheel vibrating or remaining 'off-center' when driving straight.

**A** If you have a balance due to the IRS or Mo. Department of Revenue you have a number of options to pay it. You can set up an installment agreement, consolidating multiple years and have up to 5 yrs., or 60 months to spread the balance over a longer period. This can be done online by either setting up an account with them, or making a regular payment for the date and amount you deem feasible. Mailing in a check is very iffy on when they receive the payment and when it will be posted. If you pay online you get confirmation, plus they email a proof of payment receipt. (This acts as your cancelled check) An e-check has no fees (Mo. charges \$.50 processing fee). Credit and Debit cards have processing fees.

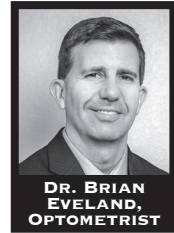

## Let's be safe out there

Fourth of July is a time to celebrate and make good, informed decisions

With huge crowds coming to area Lakes for the July Fourth holiday, the Lake of the Ozarks Water Safety Council is urging visitors and residents to pay attention to safety.

"The July Fourth holiday is traditionally the biggest weekend on the Lake which means careful attention to safety is extremely important to enjoying a fun weekend," said Doug Beck, co-chair of the Lake of the Ozarks Water Safety Council. Important tips for safe boating include:

**•Be a sober boater** - Operating a boat while under the influence is against the law in Missouri and any boat operator found with a blood alcohol concentration above 0.08% can be charged with Boating While Intoxicated (BWI).

**•Be prepared with your life jackets** - Life jackets must always be the appropriate type for the user's weight and size. A life jacket must always be worn by anyone on a personal watercraft. Any boat 16 feet long or more must have a readily accessible and appropriate jacket for each occupant. Life jacket use is a great idea while swimming off a dock, beach or boat.

**•Working navigation lights** - These lights are critical to boating between sunrise and sunset and must be in working order.

**•Have a sound producing device** - The device could be as simple as a whistle or horn. It is used to signal your intentions to other boats.

**•Carry up-to-date fire extinguishers** - Boats are required to carry one or more appropriate fire extinguishers with a manufacturer date that is under 12 years.

**•Know the rules of the road when boating** - If overtaking another boat, the boat being passed has the right-of-way so stay clear. When meeting head on, keep to the right. If crossing, the boat on the right has the right-of-way, slow and let them pass.

**About the Water Safety Council**

The Lake of the Ozarks Water Safety Council is a not-for-profit public service organization that promotes boating and water safety at the Lake of the Ozarks and the Midwest. The Water Safety Council was formed in 2007 with the mission of promoting water safety and to serve as a source for boating and water safety information. The Council has representation from the local area Chambers of Commerce, Missouri State Highway Patrol-Water Division, Camden County Health Department, U.S. Coast Guard, Ameren Missouri and community members.



Wearing an engine cut-off switch lanyard or wireless engine cut-off device will shut the engine down if the operator is ejected or falls overboard. It may also prevent you from being run over by your own boat.



## Plan a safe July Fourth holiday

The July Fourth holiday weekend is a great opportunity to enjoy one of Missouri's recreational opportunities or a backyard barbecue.

The Missouri State Highway Patrol reminds Missouri's travelers to make smart choices for a safe July Fourth holiday. Everyone should place safety at the top of their list when planning how to celebrate our nation's freedoms. No matter how you decide to celebrate, your smartest choice is to follow all Missouri traffic and boating laws.

During the 2022 counting period, 11 people were killed and 449 injured in Missouri over the holiday in 1,069 traffic crashes. Over the 2022 July Fourth holiday, troopers arrested 146 people for driving while intoxicated. In 2022, there were nine boating crashes, which included five injuries

and no fatalities. One person drowned during last year's July Fourth holiday. Troopers made 13 boating while intoxicated arrests over last year's July Fourth holiday weekend.

The 2023 counting period for the July Fourth holiday will be from 6 p.m., Friday, June 30, to 11:59 p.m., Tuesday, July 4, 2022.

The Highway Patrol will be participating in Operation C.A.R.E. (Crash Awareness & Reduction Effort) and Operation Dry Water over the July Fourth holiday. Operation Dry Water specifically targets impaired vessel operators. All available troopers will be patrolling Missouri roadways and waterways to enforce traffic and boating laws, and offering assistance as needed.

**Boaters, too**

Missouri's boaters are asked

to do their part by remaining alert for other boats and swimmers, and being courteous on the water. Never operate a vessel if you've consumed alcohol. Boaters need to be aware that it is illegal to discharge fireworks from a vessel. Leave all fireworks in a safe place on shore. Remember to share the waterway and use common sense, good judgment and courtesy to ensure the safety of all. Life jackets save lives. Wear It.

Anyone needing assistance or who witnesses criminal activity while traveling on Missouri's roadways or waterways can contact the nearest Highway Patrol troop headquarters by calling the Patrol Emergency Report Line at 1-800-525-5555 or \*55 on a cellular phone. Motorists may call 1-888-275-6636 to check for road construction along their travel route.

## Red Cross offers fireworks and grill safety tips

The American Red Cross wants everyone to enjoy a safe and fun Fourth of July and offers these tips for keeping it safe:

**Fireworks safety**

- Skip fireworks at home. Attend a public show or celebrate with glow sticks or noise makers instead.
- Keep a supply of water close by as a precaution.
- Wear eye protection when lighting fireworks.
- Light only one firework at

a time, and never attempt to relight "a dud."

**Grill safety**

- Keep the grill out in the open, away from the house, deck, tree branches or anything that could catch fire.
- Don't add charcoal starter fluid when coals have already been ignited.
- Always supervise a barbecue grill when in use.
- Make sure everyone, including pets, stays away from the

grill.

- Use the long-handled tools especially made for cooking on the grill to help keep the chef safe.
  - Wash your hands before preparing the food.
  - Don't leave food out in the hot sun. Keep perishable foods in a cooler with plenty of ice or freezer gel packs.



Summary of Bonded Indebtedness





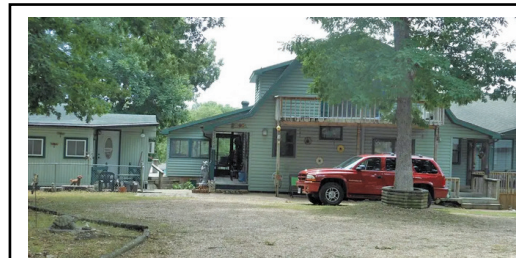

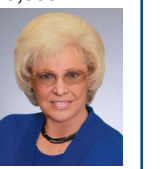
